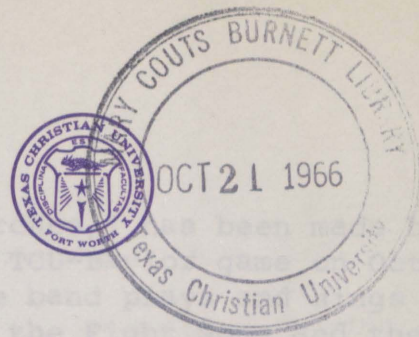
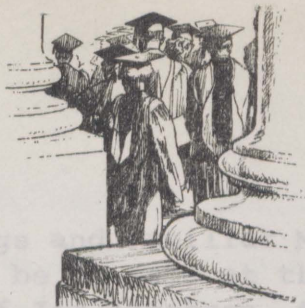

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TONIGHT IS LILI KRAUS' CONCERT

Tonight in Ed Landreth Auditorium at 8:00 p.m. Lili Kraus, the internationally-famed pianist, will present a concert. The event is free and open to all faculty, students and the public. Perhaps we don't always appreciate activities as much as we should when there is no cost, but this is one event that provides each of us a rare opportunity to hear one of the great ladies of the concert world. Mme. Kraus has been a soloist with leading orchestras since she was 16. She has given concerts, taught master classes for students and teachers, lectured, appeared on television and in special festival appearances throughout the world. Hungarian born, she is praised as a poet among pianists and one of the world's finest interpreters of Mozart, having recorded all 25 of the Mozart solo concerti. Her program tonight will include works by Bach, Mozart, Bartok and Schubert. Mme. Kraus served for the second time as a jurist for the Van Cliburn Competition and she will join the Fine Arts faculty at TCU in February as artist-in-residence.

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BAND MAKES NEW ALBUM
