METROPLEX ART SHOW MOVES TO FALL

Art in the Metroplex, a juried show held on campus annually under sponsorship of TCU and The Committee for an Artists' Center, has been moved from summer to early fall this year and will be a feature of Fort Worth Gallery Nights for the first time.

The showing of painting, drawing, printmaking, mixed media, photography and sculpture will be held Sept. 6 through Oct. 3 in both Brown-Lupton Gallery and Moudy Building Exhibition Hall, said art chair Ron Watson.

The works are being juried by Peter Frank, an independent art critic who writes for Artforum, Art in America, ARTnews and Womanart. He has curated shows for Artists' Books and the Guggenheim Museum and has been on the staffs of the Village Voice, Soho News and National Arts Guide.

Awards will be \$1,000 for first place; \$750 for second; \$500 for third; \$250 for fourth; and \$100 honorable mention. The show is made possible in part by donations from The Arts Organization, The Fifth Avenue Foundation, The Fleming Foundation, John L. Clardy, JoAnn Durham, Bob Fiesler and Edward R. Hudson Jr.

The opening reception and announcement of awards for Art in the Metroplex will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. Sept. 6 in both Brown-Lupton Gallery and Moudy Exhibition Space, and awards will be presented in the Moudy Building at 7 p.m. that day. The juror, Frank, will be present.

The show will be an entirely new one, since all works submitted must have been completed within the last two years and no work previously shown in an Art in the Metroplex competition may be entered.

A number of groups have already been on campus. These include Shakespeare in the Park personnel, the Miss Texas National Teen-Ager Pageant, two football camps and Texas Association of Student Councils. Held last week were the Texas Firefighter's Olympic Games with 400 competing and the Diocesan Conference on Catholic Charismatic Renewal with 800 participants.

DOWNEY WILL BE INTERIM DEAN

Kirk Downey, chairman of the Department of Management since 1983, has been named interim dean of the Neeley School of Business. To assume the position in mid-summer, he will succeed Ed Johnson, who will become dean of the College of Business Administration and Graduate School of Business Administration at the University of Colorado in Boulder.

Announcement of the appointment was made by Bill Koehler, vice chancellor for academic affairs. "Kirk's experience and leadership abilities are well known, not only to the faculty in the School of Business but also across the campus and in the community," he said. "I am confident he will provide significant leadership."

A search for a new dean for the Neeley School will begin in early fall, according to Vice Chancellor Koehler. Construction is due to begin soon on a major addition to the Neeley School facility. The \$8.2 million expansion project will double the space available for the business school.

Kirk, whose major academic areas are organizational behavior and administrative theory along with policy and decision making, was a member of the Oklahoma State University faculty for eight years before coming to TCU. Holder of the Ph.D. degree from Pennsylvania State University, he is past editor of the Journal of Management and has served on the editorial board of Academy of Management Review and Journal of Business Research. Well known as a consultant to financial institutions, he is the author or co-author of studies published in leading professional journals. He is active in the Academy of Management.

RELAY TEAM SETS NEW NCAA MARK

The Frogs' 400-meter relay team set a new NCAA record, a stunning 38.46, while winning its event during the recent NCAA track and field meet in Indianapolis. The old mark of 38.53 was set by Houston and Carl Lewis in 1982. The purple racers are Roscoe Tatum, Andrew Smith, Leroy Reid and Greg Sholars, and Coach Bubba Thornton is delighted that three are sophomores and one a junior.

Assisting TCU in collecting enough points to come in 16th in the meet were Michael Cannon, third in the 400-meter race; Rebecca Allison, fourth in the women's 1,500-meter; and Johnny Walker, 1985 SWC champion, ninth in the 800-meter race.

FRESHMAN APPLICATIONS RISE 3.9 PERCENT

Applications from freshmen for the fall semester stood at 3.9 percent over the number for the 1985 fall semester as of May 15. According to a report issued by Dean Ned Boehm, 3,341 had applied this year. The total is a 1.3 percent decrease in males and a 7.9 percent increase in females over a year ago.

Total applications for fall number 3,996, a figure which is 72 persons larger than in 1985 for a 1.8 percent increase. Transfer applications are down 48 persons for an 8.2 percent decline, and international student applications are down 4.1 percent from a year ago.

FROGS, MUSTANGS WILL HAVE 'BOWL' GAME

TCU's Frogs and SMU's Mustangs will play a "bowl" game this season, although both teams have NCAA sanctions keeping them out of post-season bowls. The Sept. 27 meeting of the long-time rivals has been rescheduled for the Cotton Bowl on opening day of the Sesquicentennial State Fair of Texas.

The 2 p.m. game, originally set for Texas Stadium, will coincide with the centennial observance of the State Fair and SMU's 75th anniversary. To be promoted as an official Sesquicentennial event, the idea of the Frog-Pony clash was initiated five years ago by the Dallas Sesquicentennial Committee. Plans have been refined by TCU and SMU athletic directors. Sponsors of the event will be Dallas-based Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. in conjunction with a number of its local grocery store outlets. In the last two years, the TCU-SMU game has drawn 58,206 and 42,214 fans, respectively.

NEW CHAIR HOLDER AWARDED FULBRIGHT

Eugene Boring, incoming Bradford Distinguished Professor in Religion-Studies, has been awarded a Fulbright grant to conduct research on the literary form of the New Testament Gospels in Gottingen, West Germany. He will teach here during the fall semester and will be in Gottingen from January to August of 1987. Dr. Boring has been Darbeth Distinguished Professor of New Testament at the Graduate Seminary of Phillips University.

NURSING MANAGEMENT WILL BE WORKSHOP THEME

Nursing management in long-term care will be the theme of a day-long workshop planned for June 26 under the sponsorship of Harris College of Nursing and Nursing Supportive Services. Designed primarily for directors of nursing and other supervisory personnel in long-term care facilities, the 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. session will be held in the Annie Richardson Bass Building.

Presenters for the program will include Carolyn Bussey of Mansfield Nursing Home; Dr. Mary Lou Smith, vice president of nursing at St. Joseph Hospital; True Picht of Haltom Memorial Convalescent Nursing Home; and Kathy Walls, Lake Lodge Home Health Care. TCU participants will be Mildred Hogstel, Katy Nichols and John Sheridan.

Topics to be explored will range from trends in health care to reduction of personnel turnover and from prevention of burnout to nursing directors' influence on staff performance. A question-discussion session will conclude the day's schedule.

According to Vice Chancellor Peggy Barr, TCU is the only school in the nation that includes this aspect in the very important process of getting to know the institution.

Transfer students are being encouraged to sign up for the July 6-8 program, and the Aug. 18-20 session is reserved for students who live 500 or more miles from Fort Worth. REPORT SHOWS RISE IN SPRING GRADE AVERAGES

Grade-point averages for various groupings of undergraduate students were higher for the 1986 spring semester than a year ago. According to a report issued June 4 by Dean of Students Libby Proffer, the figures include all day students, all undergraduate men and all undergraduate women as well as all freshman men and all freshman women.

Of 13 residence halls, 10 had GPA's above theirs for the 1985 spring term. The only ones with lower averages were Pete Wright, Tom Brown and Waits halls. Of these same 13, nine had averages above those for comparable groups . . . i.e., comparison of grades of students in Colby with grades of all freshman women, Pete Wright with all freshman men and all other halls with either all undergraduate men or all undergraduate women.

Four residential units--Colby Hall, Jarvis, sororities on Worth Hills and Tom Brown--earned grade averages above 3.0, the report shows. Residence halls in order of their ranking were Jarvis with 3.038; Tom Brown, 3.030; Colby Hall, 3.029; Foster, 2.996; Waits, 2.990; Clark, 2.921; Sherley, 2.883; Brachman, 2.852; Wiggins, 2.840; Pete Wright, 2.813; Milton Daniel, 2.461. The GPA for sororities was 3.118 and for fraternities 2.731.

URBAN STUDENTS SCHOOLED IN PROFESSIONAL JOURNALISM

Twenty-one students from throughout the Metroplex are participating in the journalism department's 11th annual TCU/UTA High School Journalism Workshop for Minorities. Chosen from approximately 70 applicants, the students are judged on writing ability and expressed interest in the field of print journalism.

Workshop director Anantha Babbili of journalism said the workshop's primary purpose is to introduce students to the numerous career options in journalism and secondarily to encourage them to attend college and enter the journalism field. During the two-week workshop, which ends Friday, students tour local newsrooms and government offices, produce an eight-page newspaper and meet with numerous professionals, including columnist Jon McConal, editorial writer Cecil Johnson and cartoonists Etta Hulme and J.D. Crowe of the Star-Telegram; broadcast journalists Bob Ray Sanders (KERA-FM), John McCaa (WFAA-TV) and Phyllis Watson, KDFW-TV; and Fort Worth Police Department spokesman Doug Clarke.

The workshop is funded by the Star-Telegram, Dallas Morning News, Dallas Times Herald and Dow Jones Newspaper Fund. Faculty members are Herb Frazier and Olin Chism of the Times Herald; Lawrence Young and Tom Leferink of the Star-Telegram; Jean Johnson, Dallas News; Bill Celis, Wall Street Journal; and Dr. Tom Shuford, UTA journalism professor. Tommy Thomason (journalism) also is participating.

Students include six from two Fort Worth high schools, O.D. Wyatt and Dunbar; eight from Hillcrest, Thomas Jefferson, Health Magnet, Skyline, Talented and Gifted Students high schools and Ursuline Academy in Dallas; and others from Richardson, Carrollton, Grand Prairie and Arlington schools.
