Former president of Costa Rica to speak

DR. OSCAR ARIAS, FORMER PRESIDENT of Costa Rica and 1987 Nobel Peace laureate, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 16 in the Dee J. Kelly Alumni & Visitor's Center.

Arias' discussion, "Latin America: New Challenges for a New Century," will explore the topics of arms control and moratorium, education and development, ethics and leadership. The free, public lecture is part of TCU's new Frost Foundation Global Lectureship Series.

Arias was elected president of Costa Rica in 1986. In 1987, he drafted a peace plan to end hostility between countries in the region. Widely known as the Arias Peace Plan, his initiative brought about the signing of the Procedure to Establish a Firm and Lasting Peace in Central America by all the Central American presidents. That same year he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, using the monetary award to establish the Arias Foundation for Peace and Human Progress. He then met with seven other Nobel Peace laureates to publicly unveil an International Code of Conduct on Arms Transfers.

The lectureship series is made possible by a grant from the Frost Foundation of Santa Fe, New Mexico. The Frost Foundation was created to be operated exclusively for educational, charitable and religious purposes. Since its founding in 1959, it has expanded its focus to include health groups, social services, humanitarian needs and the environment. The foundation was named in honor of Edwin Ambrose Frost and Virginia Chappelle Frost. ♦

Batter up! Baseball season is here

DESPITE THE CHILLY WEATHER, baseball season officially got under way Jan. 31. Unfortunately, Mother Nature did not cooperate and the Frogs season opener against the University of Texas - Arlington was rained out. The two teams took to the diamond 24 hours later and while the weather was fine, it was the Mavericks who spoiled TCU's home opener upending the Frogs 9-6 on a three-run homer in the bottom of the ninth inning. The Frogs responded resoundingly, blowing out UTA 22-0 the following day at the TCU baseball field.

Led by preseason All-American Chris Connally, TCU baseball fans can expect lots of offense this year. Last year's team hit a TCU-record 75 home runs with Connally, a senior outfielder, going for a .414 average, 23 home runs and 72 runs batted in. TCU also welcomes back junior third baseman Royce Huffman who wound up hitting .387 last year with eight homers and 46 RBIs. Other notable returners include catcher Mark Silva, first baseman David Wallace, second baseman Sam Lunsford, shortstop Jef Yarbrough and third baseman Matt Howe. The seven combined to hit .333 with 46 home runs last year.

On the other side of the plate, the loss of four key members from last year's pitching staff is offset by the return of two-time all Southwest Conference pitcher Scott Atchison. Atchison returns to the lineup after sitting out last year recovering from shoulder surgery. He will be joined on the mound by Jeff Shaddix, Heath Collins and Shawn Thompson.

Coach Lance Brown said he expects this year's team to be pretty well balanced. "Our pitching, defense and offense should complement each other," he said. "We can still win games when we don't get great pitching or score a lot of runs."
