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# Postoffice Open For Plane Mail

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## Seven Arrive From Mani- la On P. I. Clipper

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For the convenience of those who may want to rush mail to the Coast because of the tie-up caused by the shipping strike, the postoffice will be open from 8 to 11 a.m. today to accept airmail for the Philippine Clipper, leaving for Alameda at noon today.

The Clipper will take only airmail, postal authorities said yesterday in answer to many who asked if she would take regular mail scheduled to go out on the Lurline.

The Clipper came down at the Pearl City base at 5:52 p.m. yesterday after an uneventful flight from Midway.

Aboard were most of the party which she took on the westward flight prior to opening of regular passenger service. Those arriving were Sen. and Mrs. William Gibbs McAdoo, of California; Amon G.

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Carter, Fort Worth publisher; E. O. McDonnell, Pan American Airways director; J. G. Stahlman, Nashville, Tenn., publisher; G. B. Grosvenor, PAA director, and E. R. Swasey, Hearst newspaper executive. All but Swasey will continue to Alameda on the ship when she leaves today.

Roy W. Howard, publisher of the New York World-Telegram, and Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, who made the westward flight on the Philippine Clipper, are still in the Orient and will perhaps return on the China Clipper. Juan Trippe, FAA president, who made the westward flight, is scheduled to continue on around the world from the Orient.

The Clipper will take no passengers from Honolulu save those going through, PAA officials announced yesterday. She is expected to take out over 500 pounds of mail.
