Dear Frank:

Enclosed, herewith, you will find a copy of my letter to Norman Davis, Chairman of the American Red Cross, and I am also sending you a copy of Amon Junior's letter which shows that both the Post Office Department and the Censorship Office are permitting some packages to go through twice as large to officers as I am permitted to send to Amon Junior.

You can appreciate what this means in an isolated prison camp to have some officers receive larger packages than others when they are supposed to be on the same basis. Irrespective of what the Censorship Office says I am not going to dispute Amon Junior's word when he tells me that some of the packages are twice the size of his own package.

I asked Norman Davis why it would not be possible for the Red Cross, the Post Office Department, the Censor Chief and the proper division of the War Department to get together and iron out some of these seemingly unnecessary red tape regulations. I realize that all of you are busy and further realize you are trying to do the best job possible - still I feel sure if you or any of the others on the Board had a son in the same situation as mine, as well as hundreds of others, you could probably make some allowance for my extreme feeling on this matter.
