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APPROXIMATELY 800 TO BE GRADUATED

Some 800 earned degrees will be conferred upon Class of 1988 members Saturday evening during baccalaureate-commencement. The combined ceremony will begin at 7:30 p.m. in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum with Chancellor Bill Tucker presiding.

Special music will be provided by The University Band, directed by Bob Blanton. The call to worship, as well as the benediction, will be given by John Butler, minister to the University. Leading the hymns will be Associate Professor Arden Hopkin.

Chancellor Tucker's remarks will be followed by the awarding of degrees. Taking part in the ceremony will be Vice Chancellor Bill Koehler and deans Mike McCracken, Kirk Downey, Doug Hastad, John Mangieri, Pat Scearse, Jack Suggs and Faculty Senate Chairman Daryl Schmidt.

Chief marshal is Dave Edmunds, and Art Berliner is associate marshal. Assisting them will be Joe Helmick, Jim Henley, Anantha Babbili, Charles Blount, Don Coerver, Lee Daniel, David Grant, Gene McCluney, Al Mladenka, Harry Opperman, Frank Reuter and Carol Stephenson.

Both faculty members and students will assemble under the stadium's east stands at 6:45 p.m. for the procession.

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RECITAL, RECEPTION HONOR GRADUATES

Spring graduates and those who completed their degrees in December, along with members of their families, will be honored at two events Saturday afternoon.

An organ recital will be presented by Willie Martinez, member of the Class of 1988. The public event will begin at 2:15 p.m. in Robert Carr Chapel.

Willie, a senior from Texas City, has been named a Fulbright Scholar to Germany for the coming year. The 12th TCU organ student to receive one of the prestigious awards, he will study at the Robert Schumann Conservatory in Dusseldorf.

Hosted by the University, a reception for graduating seniors and their families is scheduled from 3:30 to 5 p.m. in the Student Center ballroom. The special occasion provides opportunity for faculty and staff members to join in the day's festivities with the graduates.

GRADUATES ACE SOCIAL WORK EXAM

Once again 100 percent of TCU's social work graduates who took the Texas social work certification exams passed. This is the second year the test has been required by the Department of Human Services and the second perfect showing by TCU social work graduates. Not only did all takers pass, said program director Art Berliner, but the mean scores of TCU alumni are approximately 10 points higher than the state average.

"The perfect passing rate is an indication of the hard work and enthusiasm of our graduates," Art said. "The social work program has a fine student group and a competent faculty; that combination has paid off."

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SIMPSON NAMED SENIOR PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Rene Simpson, a senior from Willowdale, Ontario, has been selected by the Southwest Awards Committee as the 1988 "Southwest Region Volvo Tennis/Senior Player of the Year." As a result of this honor, Rene is included in a group of seven other regional winners to be considered for selection as the national player-of-the-year.

A three-time all-Southwest Conference honoree, Rene recently captured the SWC No. 1 singles title, recording a perfect 6-0 mark against her conference opponents this spring. She is currently ranked No. 12 in the nation in singles and No. 9 in doubles with teammate Tory Plunkett.

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FRESHMAN WINS MATH BEE

Doug Strout, a freshman chemistry/physics major from Houston, took first place in the mathematics department's sixth annual Integration Bee April 20. A take-off on the spelling bee, the competition requires students to work calculus integrals in direct competition with one another.

Competition among the 16 contestants, ranging from freshmen to graduate students, was especially intense this year, reported Bob Doran, director of the competition. The bee went to 12 rounds and lasted nearly an hour and a half before Doug was declared the winner. Second-place went to freshman Chris Oehrlein of Singapore; finishing third was last year's winner, Shawn Reynolds, junior mathematics major from Arlington.

Bob borrowed the idea of the bee from MIT, where he was a visiting scholar in 1981. Mathematics faculty members helped administer the contest; Charles Deeter served as time- and score-keeper, Victor Belfi took photographs and Landon Colquitt, Roy Combrink and Peng Fan served as graders.

MILLER ACCEPTS REGISTRAR APPOINTMENT

Pat Miller, coordinator of enrollment management who also has served as acting registrar since last fall, will become registrar on June 1.

In announcing the appointment, Vice Chancellor Bill Koehler noted that it was made "only after a lengthy and careful screening of numerous candidates" and that it indicated "a significant vote of confidence" in Pat's abilities as well as tangible evidence of his outstanding qualifications.

Pat joined the TCU staff in 1981 as associate director of the Center for Organizational Research and Evaluation Studies (CORES). He later served as its interim director. Author of a number of published works in such journals as the Sociological Quarterly, Pat has served on the Committee for the Future of Fort Worth and on the governor's task forces for juvenile service programs.

Holder of the B.A. degree from Emory University, Pat earned the M.A. degree at the University of Tennessee, where he has completed all but the dissertation for a Ph.D. in sociology. Before coming to Fort Worth, he was program manager for an allied research group at the Center for Urban Affairs and Community Services at North Carolina State University. He was a research analyst in the Social and Behavioral Science Laboratory at the University of Missouri in St. Louis, where he was a visiting lecturer in 1974-76.

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COMMISSIONING SERVICES SET

During the same week as their commencement from TCU, 20 Air Force and Army ROTC cadets will receive commissions in their respective branches of the U.S. military. Both services are open to all.

Air Force commissioning will begin at 12:30 p.m. Friday in Amon G. Carter Stadium. Gen. Thomas Baker, vice commander of Air Training Command, will give an address and administer the commissioning oath of office. The program also includes an awards ceremony, cadet review parade, music by the Eighth Air Force Marching Band and a flyover by the 80th Flight Training Wing from Sheppard Air Force Base.

Army commissioning will be at 10 a.m. Saturday in Moudy Building Room 141N; cadets will take the oath of office and receive their gold bars and presidential appointment certificates.

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AEROBICS TO BE OFFERED THIS SUMMER

Low-impact aerobics will be offered at 5 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays and at 6 p.m. Tuesdays. Advanced aerobics will meet at 5 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and at 6 p.m. Wednesdays. 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SWIMMING, DIVING CAMPS SET

Four sessions of swimming and diving camps of two weeks each will begin June 6. Each swimming and diving session includes eight 40-minute lessons. The sessions are planned for June 6-16, June 20-30, July 5-14 and July 18-28. Parents are welcome to observe during Thursday classes.

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COLOR GUARD TAKES FIRST PLACE

Air Force ROTC's color guard was selected best in the nation after competing in the 17th annual U.S. Air Force Academy National Invitational Drill Meet April 15-17. The unit took first place over 11 other teams from across the country in competition that included an open ranks inspection and 30-command drill sequence.

Color guard members include Robert Maier, Chris Williams, Allen Wilson, Aly Gomez and first alternate Derck Birdwell. The unit is commanded by cadets Dean Clothier and Brad Pense. Earlier this semester the unit placed fourth in a similar competition at Tulane University.

FROG TEAM TAKES TENNIS TITLE

With help from a come-from-behind win in the final doubles match, the third-seeded Horned Frogs edged top-seeded Arkansas 5-4 to win TCU's first Southwest Conference tennis tournament. The title was won April 24 in the SWC Tennis Championships played at Austin's Penick-Allison Tennis Center. The Frogs, ranked 14th in the nation, now are assured of a berth in the NCAA Tennis Tournament that begins May 20 in Athens, GA.

The doubles team of Clint Banducci and Earl Zinn had a three-set victory--3-6, 6-3 and 6-4--that matched them at the four count with Arkansas, making the No. 2 doubles match the deciding factor in who won the title. According to the Star-Telegram, "it took some 11th-hour magic, but Doug Gleason and Paul Hart proved they were up to the challenge." The duo made up for a 5-2 deficit in the third set and then won the tiebreaker 7-2 against Arkansas. Earlier the Frogs' Eric Lingg and Gerard Ronan lost 6-4, 6-4 to an Arkansas team.

TCU's players "gave a maximum effort," according to Tut Bartzen, now in his 14th year as tennis coach. Individual championships are among earlier titles, but the team title "is really a big deal for us."
