## SOCIAL WORKERS "RETURN THE GIFT OF CARING"

Area social work agencies will come together at TCU tomorrow (Wednesday) to inform students about career opportunities in their fields as well as to let the public know what services they offer. The Human Services Day event, sponsored by the Social Work Club, will be held in the Student Center from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Agencies to be represented include Child Study Center, Edna Gladney Home, Family Service, Federal Correction Institute, Fort Worth Counseling Center, Lena Pope Home, Mental Health Association, Fort Worth State School, Tarrant County Cancer Society, Spruce Emergency Shelter and Texas Rehabilitation Commission.

TCU Human Services Day is being sponsored in conjunction with the National Association of Social Work's annual observance of March as Social Work Month. The 1986 theme is "Aging Parents--Return the Gift of Caring." In response to this, the Social Work Club also will take food and visit individually with residents of a Stanford Convalescent Center. The club is involved in community projects year-round and offers information and support for social work majors.

Charlene Urwin, faculty sponsor, says, "This is a chance for recognition of social work as a profession. There is often a narrow view of what social workers do. Human Services Day shows the kinds of diversity in our profession."

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## MUSIC REACHES MANY COMMUNITIES

TCU's Department of Music will touch a variety of music-lovers in Texas, Oklahoma and the Midwest during March. The Concert Chorale will sing this week in Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Dallas. The Jazz Ensemble will perform for high schools in Illinois, Indiana and Missouri during spring break. Here at home TCU will join Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary to present lectures, seminars and a Festival of Contemporary English Hymns March 10-14.

For the third consecutive year, the Concert Chorale has been invited to perform for a convention of the American Choral Directors Association. The 1986 appearance will be Friday in Tulsa, where choral directors from the seven-state Southwest region of the national association will be beginning a two-day session. The chorale, directed by Ron Shirey, sang for the Southwest regional meeting in Dallas in 1984 and for the national convention in Salt Lake City last year.

The choir's Friday performance will include *Personent Hodie*, a 13th Century processional arranged for TCU and University Christian Church by Lara Hoggard; *O Magnum Mysterium* by Tomas Luis de Victoria; Bach's Cantata 150; selections from *Five Songs* by Brahms; selections from *Liebeslieder Polkas* by P.D.Q. Bach; Mendelssohn's *Behold, God the Lord Passed By!*; and Benjamin Britten's *Ballad of Green Broom*. The chorale also will sing tomorrow (Wednesday) at First Christian Church, Oklahoma City; Thursday at Southside Christian, Tulsa; and Saturday at Oak Cliff Christian, Dallas. Tulsa area alumni and friends are being invited to a reception at Southside Christian after the concert.

Church musicians and the public are welcome at the hymn festival, to be conducted by distinguished British hymnologist and composer Peter Cutts at 7 p.m. March 14 at Robert Carr Chapel. Church musicians are invited to two sessions led by Cutts--Peter Hodgson's musicology seminar from 8:15 to 11 a.m. March 12 in Ed Landreth Hall Room 201D and a hymnology seminar from 2 to 3 p.m. that day in Room C51, Cowden Hall at the seminary.

A limited number of visitors also may be accommodated in a composer's forum on hymn tune composition from 1 to 2 p.m. March 10 in Cowden Hall Room C53 and Emmet Smith's organ class at 3 p.m. that day in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Cutts, a faculty member at Bretton Hall, a teachers college in Wakefield, England, is teaching during the current academic year at St. Andrews University, Scotland.

Curt Wilson and the 22 members of the Jazz Ensemble will perform concerts/clinics at 2 p.m. March 17 at Hinsdale, IL, high school; the morning of March 18 at Chesterton, IN, high; 4 p.m. March 18, Concord high, Elkhart, IN; 12:15 p.m. March 19, Elk Grove high, Elk Grove Village, IL; and 1:30 p.m. March 20, Chaminade College Prep School, St. Louis.

During the Illinois and Indiana portion of the tour, the TCU group will be joined by Chicago saxophonist Roger Pemberton, last year's TCU Jazz Festival guest and a clinician for C.G. Conn, Inc., noted instrument firm. Conn is sponsoring Pemberton on the tour. A Conn vice president, 1956 TCU graduate Jim Smith, also will entertain the Jazz Ensemble at dinner in his Elkhart home on March 18 and has arranged for the group to visit the Conn factory in Elkhart. The Jazz Ensemble tour has been made possible in part by a grant from the TCU House of Student Representatives.

CBS EXECUTIVE IS GUEST OF RADIO-TV-FILM

Broadcast executive George Dessart, whose position includes participating in the overall supervision of the CBS Television Network and CBS Entertainment, is guest this week as Visiting Green Professor. He is being hosted by the radio-television-film department.

On March 6 Dessart will present a public lecture, beginning at 8 p.m. in Room 141N of the Moudy Building. "Bishop Berkely's Broadcast: The Nature of Networks Now and in the 21st Century" will be his topic for the free program.

Dessart, vice president and assistant to the president of CBS/Broadcasting Group since 1983, formerly had primary responsibilities for CBS Radio, CBS Cable and CBS Broadcast International as well as the network's television stations. Prior to being named a network vice president in 1977, he was associated with WCBS-TV in New York as director of both special broadcasts and community affairs and then as executive assistant general manager. He also served as producer, director, writer and public affairs director for WCAU-TV in Philadelphia.

Recipient of New York and regional Emmy awards, he has such honors as the Sidney Hillman Award, CINE Golden Eagle, San Francisco and American Film Festival awards to his credit. He has received 15 awards from Ohio State University in addition to honors from the Institute for Education by Radio and Television and the Alfred S. Dupont Award.

Dessart was a member of the original Carnegie Corporation consulting task force that devised "Sesame Street." In addition to other consulting roles, he has taught at the Annenberg School of Communications at the University of Pennsylvania, Hunter College, New York University and Lehman College of City University of New York. He is the author of a number of published works, including those published by the National Council of Teachers of English and the ALA Bulletin.

Co-chairman of the International Radio and Television Society, Dessart is president of the New York chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences. Since 1975 he has chaired the Advisory Council on Educational Telecommunications to the New York State Board of Regents.

An interview with Dessart will be featured March 8 on "Sidewalk Talk," a program presented by KTCU-FM, 88.7, at 10 a.m.

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FORUMS SCHEDULES HALLEY'S COMET TALK

A slide/lecture on Halley's Comet will be presented in Student Center ballroom at 7:30 p.m. today (Tuesday) by George Ellis, national president of the world's largest organization of amateur astronomers. Ellis heads the Federation of Societies of Astronomical Leagues, and his slide presentation was produced locally for nationwide showing. His TCU appearance, open to the public, is sponsored by TCU Forums. Ellis, a General Dynamics engineer, holds a computer science degree from Georgia Tech.

CIVIL WAR STORY LATEST TCU PRESS ISSUE

"The Wolf and the Buffalo" by Elmer Kelton, the just-published fifth title in the Texas Tradition Series of the TCU Press, chronicles the parallel lives of two men caught by the tide of white settlers that swept across the Western frontier after the Civil War. The series, designed to publish and to preserve significant Texas literature, is edited by Tom Pilkington, professor of English at Tarleton State University.

Jacket illustration for the new volume, which features the two prominent characters, was done especially for this edition by Fort Worth artist Burl Washington, who has made an extensive study of the Ninth and Tenth Cavalries. The original watercolor, on display last week at Fort Worth's City Hall, is one of a series of Washington's works dealing with buffalo soldiers.

"The Wolf and the Buffalo" is one of five works chosen for discussion in libraries across Texas in the program entitled "Texas Voices: 1836-1986" during March and April.

Gray Horse, one of the book's two central characters, is a Comanche warrior whose medicine comes from the wolf. He gains his strength from the structured beliefs and tribal system of the Indian, a world that is rapidly disintegrating. Gideon Ledbetter, one of the Tenth Cavalry's black or "buffalo" soldiers, is rootless and drifting until he joins the army, which offers the only career or future available to a freed slave at that time. The focus of the novel shifts between these two men, emphasizing the novel's rising tension as they move toward a climactic confrontation in the hot, dusty plains of Texas. At the time the book was initially published by Doubleday in 1980, Reader's Digest called it "a fascinating look at one of the most colorful, turbulent and heartbreaking chapters in American history." The TCU Press edition has a new introduction by Kelton and an afterword by Laurence Clayton of Hardin-Simmons University.

Two other novels by Kelton, best known for his Texas-based works, published by the TCU Press are "The Time It Never Rained" and "The Good Old Boys." Kelton is the author of more than 25 novels, four of which have won a Spur Award from Western Writers of America and two of which have earned the Western Heritage Award from the Cowboy Hall of Fame.

"The Wolf and the Buffalo" is available in cloth (\$17.95) and paper (\$10.95) in the TCU bookstore.

FOOD PREFERENCES, AVOIDANCES TO BE GUEST'S TOPIC

"Toward a Theory of Food Preferences and Avoidances" will be the topic discussed by anthropologist Marvin Harris of the University of Florida in a public presentation on March 12. To begin at 7:30 p.m. in Moudy Building 141N, his lecture will focus on what determines whether particular foods are eaten and relished or spurned and even abominated. He will examine the possibility that culture's "breadth of diet" is merely a matter of arbitrary "taste and tradition."

Dr. Harris, the developer of the theory of cultural materialism, will be a guest of the sociology department March 12-13 as a Visiting Green Professor.

Two of the anthropologist's most recent books deal with foods. They are "Good to Eat: Riddles of Food and Culture" and "Food and Evolution: Toward Theory of Human Diets." Also the author of "Sex, Death and Fertility," he is regarded as a specialist in the areas of race relations and the American economy. His research of anthropological perspectives on religions have included India's sacred cows, Jewish messianism and the recent creativism.

Dr. Harris, a graduate research professor in anthropology at Florida, also has addressed such topics as protein and the Amazon, infanticide, cannibalism, the American family today and technology and the American economy.

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COLLEGE BOWL TEAM PLACES THIRD IN COMPETITION

"They were phenomenal," said coach Rich Murrell of TCU's College Bowl team, which placed third in competition against 19 universities from Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. Composed of senior Kip Keller, juniors Hiram Jackson and Chris Brown and graduate student Cesar Prieto, the team defeated Tulane, the five-time defending champion. Texas A&M won the title, and Rice University placed second.

Murrell, Tomlinson Residence Hall director, described the competition as much more challenging than the previous year's, when the TCU team placed sixth. The three-day tournament was held at the University of Houston in late February. Alternate team members were senior Tim Bullard, sophomore Andrew Rhodes and freshman Jerry Madden.

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## MOUDY RECEIVES DAR'S HIGHEST HONOR

Chancellor Emeritus J.M. Moudy is the recipient of the highest award for service and patriotism bestowed by the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Medal of Honor was presented him by the Mary Isham Keith chapter of the DAR in ceremonies held Feb. 27 at the Fort Worth Woman's Club.

The chapter's History Medal for preservation of history went to Mack Williams, former co-owner and publisher of the Fort Worth News-Tribune, and Septima Green, holder of two degrees from TCU and a teacher in Bruce Shulkey Elementary School, received the Outstanding American History Teacher of the Year award.

Dr. Moudy served two and a half years as a U.S. Army chaplain in stateside hospitals and European infantry units after earning the bachelor's degree at TCU. He completed the B.D. degree through Brite Divinity School in 1949 and earned the Ph.D. degree at Duke University. After four years at Atlantic Christian College he returned to his alma mater and, after a number of administrative positions, was named chancellor in 1965. He retired in 1979.
