Texas Legation Records now in our library: Rare Texas history lives through 161 years

LAST WEEK MARKED THE ARRIVAL OF THE TEXAS Legation Records to the Mary Coats Burnett Library, an occasion presided over by Chancellor **Victor J. Boschini**, Provost **Nowell Donovan** and June **Koelker** (library dean). Also on hand were representatives from the Texas State Library and Archives Association.

Last November, TCU and the Texas State Library and Archives Commission unveiled a collection of state historical documents touched by the legendary Sam Houston and Stephen F. Austin, which have been on a 161-year adventure. The collection has been conserved through the efforts of private donors and the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. Now that preservation of the records has been completed, they will be housed in the Special Collections area of the library for five years. At the end of their loan to TCU, the Legation Records will return to the Commission for permanent retention in the State Archives.

The Texas Legation Records are a collection of some 250 documents created and received by the officials who maintained the official Texas Legation at Washington, D.C., from December 1836 until December 1845, when Texas was annexed into the United States. The records comprising the collection cover primarily the years 1836 to 1839 and consist mainly of the dispatches that passed between the Texas Government and its commissioners and *chargés d'affaires* at Washington, and of the notes exchanged by that Government and the United States *chargés* in Texas. According to Texas State Archivist Chris LaPlante, many of the original documents in the collection have never been

The talk, titled "Be a Rapidly Adaptive Creative Ethical Leader," is free and open to the public.

At age 10, Chin-Ning's father began teaching her strategy by reading nightly from the texts of the ancient Chinese warrior classics. She presents the warrior philosophy as a vehicle for mastering

Construction of the new Bookstore begins in April

TCU, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH BARNES & NOBLE College Booksellers, Inc., will begin construction of a new 34,000-square-foot bookstore by mid-April. The two-story facility, to be located at the corner of W. Berry Street and South University Drive, is slated for completion by the end of this year.

Along with textbooks, located on the mezzanine, the store also will sell TCU merchandise and regular retail books and magazines similar to other Barnes & Noble stores. In addition, the bookstore will feature an indoor and outdoor wireless Internet café and lounge and reading areas. Bookstore parking will be added on the northeast side of the facility.

"As a full-service Barnes & Noble bookstore, this facility will not only provide excellent services for our students, but members of our community as well," said **Brian Gutierrez**, vice chancellor for finance and administration. "We committed early on to build a first-class, aesthetically pleasing facility, and we are well

Jazz band trip to Italy has extra room for TCU travelers

THE TCU JAZZ ENSEMBLE HAS BEEN INVITED TO perform at the Umbria Jazz Festival in Perugia, Italy this summer, with additional concerts scheduled for the Valdarno Jazz Festival in Tuscany. There will also be performances in Reggio Emilia (Fort Worth's Sister City), Emilia-Romagna and at Lake Como in northern Italy.

There will be additional stops in Rome, Florence and Milan. The group will fly to Rome on July 8 and return July 19 from Florence.

Because there is room available on the tour bus, **Curt Wilson** (director of jazz studies) is inviting members of the TCU community to consider traveling along. Total cost of the 12-day trip is \$3,200, based on double occupancy, which includes everything but lunches. A professional tour guide will lead the trip and hotels will be three and four stars.

ENTREPRENEUR AND TCU BUSINESS ALUMNUS Bill Shaddock has made an innovative investment in the Neeley School of Business, to establish the Bill Shaddock Investment Fund for student-run businesses. The fund will provide low-interest debt capital, mezzanine financing and/or space at TCU Tech Fort Worth, a business and technology incubator, to small businesses started or owned by TCU students. The capital can be used to analyze a business opportunity, fund the start-up of a company or provide working capital for an existing company. Each selected TCU entrepreneur will be known as a Shaddock Entrepreneurial Fellow.

"The Bill Shaddock Investment Fund will further enhance the already renowned entrepreneurship program at Neeley and the business school as a whole," said **David Minor**, director of the Neeley Entrepreneurship Center.

"Mr. Shaddock is one of the many outstanding Neeley alumni who demonstrate how important the Neeley School is to them by getting involved and staying connected after graduation," remarked **Daniel R. Short**, dean of the Neeley School. "In addition to providing funding, his investment in Neeley promotes initiative,

inventiveness and confidence in student business ventures." ♦
