## Giordano Lecture Series will offer "insider's guide" to upcoming Cliburn Competition

"PIANO COMPETITIONS: THE CLIBURN Philosophy," a series of public lectures, will be offered at TCU prior to this year's Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, coming up May 20 - June 5 at Bass Performance Hall. Hosting the four evening events is **John Giordano**, conductor emeritus of the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, jury chair of the Cliburn Competition since 1973 and Distinguished Fellow in Music at TCU. This special program is presented free by the TCU School of Music.

The lectures are scheduled for 7 to 9 p.m. Thursdays, between April 21 - May 12 in the Moudy Bldg., rm. 141N. With guest artists and live performances included at each session, the lectures will cover a broad range of topics, including the benefits of competition in the performing arts; how the jury chooses the winners; and the diversity of repertoire and stylistic interpretation expected from today's young classical musicians. ## Jodi Campbell receives Honors Faculty Award

JODI CAMPBELL, ASSISTANT PROFESSOR of Early Modern European History in AddRan College since 2002, was presented with the 2005 Honors Faculty Recognition Award during Honors Convocation last Thursday in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Majoring in history and Spanish, Jodi was graduated from the University of Nebraska/Lincoln in 1990. She received a master's in history from Tulane University and a Ph.D. in history from the University of Minnesota.

She was an instructor and teaching assistant at Minnesota from 1993 - 1998 and taught history at Centenary College of Louisiana from 1999 - 2002.

Her research explores the meaning and purpose of popular drama in early modern Spain. ♦

TCU PRESS WILL HOST A BOOKSIGNING for actress Gayle Hunnicutt from 4 to 6 p.m. Monday, April 18 in the Cox ballroom of the Kelly Center. Her book, *Dearest Virginia: Love Letters from a Cavalry Officer in the South Pacific*, is comprised of letters from her father to her mother during World War II.

Hunnicutt, a native of Fort Worth and 1962 graduate of TCU, is an actress who first came to the public's attention in the late 1960s when she married the actor/movie star David Hemmings. They were divorced after nine years.

For more than two decades, she has been married to British journalist Simon Jenkins and lives in London although she makes frequent trips back to Fort Worth to visit her 95-year-old mother and longtime friends.
