Campus community can hear Provost candidates at scheduled forums

FACULTY AND STAFF ARE URGED TO attend the open forums to present each of the finalists for the position of Provost. The first, with Dr. Arthur Herriott (Florida International University), was held on campus last week.

Today, from 3:30 to 5 p.m., there will be a session with Dr. Michael Mezey (DePaul University) in Sid Richardson, LH2. On Wednesday, Feb. 4, from 3:30 to 5 p.m., there will be a forum for **Dr. Nowell Donovan** (TCU) in Sid Richardson, LH2.

At each forum, the candidate makes a 20-25 minute presentation to address the question, "What is the role of TCU, as a liberal arts university, in the education of ethical leaders for the global community of the 21st century?," after which is an hour-long Q&A discussion.

Evaluation forms are handed out at each forum, to be completed and returned to the Chancellor's office. ♦

Institute of Mathematics, Science, Technology again hosting mini-university

WHAT DO YOU GET WHEN YOU MIX 400 10 year-olds, a little bit of magic, some edible rocks, M&Ms, sharks, meteorites, ice cream and bats? It's TCU's mini-university, the fourth annual question-based, hands-on science and math experience designed especially for fourth graders and taught by juniors and seniors from TCU's School of Education.

The mini-university is set for 9 a.m. to noon Saturday in the Tucker Technology Center, Sid Richardson and Bass Buildings and Winton-Scott Hall. Students will participate in three 50-minute workshops, which they chose from 34 possible selections.

This event not only allows young elementary-aged students to experience college for a day but also provides opportunities for TCU education students to gain firsthand experience in course design and teaching practice. While their children are in workshops, parents will attend two informational sessions.

Dr. Ferrell, a research scientist at City of Hope National Medical Center in Los Angeles, will focus on the quality of end of life care and the role that family members can play when a loved one is dying.

"Dr. Ferrell brings such dignity to a very difficult subject," said **Linda Martin**, lecturer in the School of Nursing. "The depth of her research and clinical expertise makes her the ideal person to openly discuss how we can be prepared to help our loved ones."

Baumgardner is a former editor at *Ms.* magazine and *MAMM*, a magazine about reproductive cancer and women. She also has been a contributor to *Glamour*, *Jane*, *Mademoiselle*, *Harper's*, and *Maxim*, and to such books as *For Women Only: Your Guide to Health Empowerment*, *Dear Sisters: Dispatches from the Women's Liberation Movement*, and *The Bust Guide to the New Girl Order*.

Amy Richards has served as a contributing editor at *Ms.* magazine and worked as a consultant to Gloria Steinem, the *Ms.* Foundation for Women, First Peoples Worldwide, and Voters for Choice. Richards also co-founded Third Wave Foundation, the first and only national organization working with young women that provides them with financial resources and organizational support.

On Feb. 4, Baumgardner and Richards will present another lecture titled "Why Vote?" at 10 a.m. in the Student Center, rm. 205.

Dr. Sheryl Reiss of Cornell University will discuss the women patrons of Renaissance Italy, exploring the roles of women as art patrons in women's studies and European history. She is the author of *Beyond Isabella: Secular Women Patrons of Art in Renaissance Italy*. ♦

35 E-Business students offer their Web design skills to local non-profit organizations

THIRTY-FIVE SENIOR E-BUSINESS MAJORS will become temporary Web site consultants for eight Tarrant County non-profit organizations that apply for a new or redesigned Web site by the end of the month.

The students will work in teams of four to five in conjunction with outside E-Business industry mentors who will provide checkpoints for the team. Although there is no cost involved for the design work, the non-profit is expected to have a clearly defined need and assign a project manager to act as the liaison between the non-profit and TCU's Web site design team.

"This course provides an excellent opportunity for the students to give back to the community," said **Jane Mackay**, associate professor of management information systems/E-Business. "These are experienced designers with many having already completed internships in Web design for corporations such as Mary Kay, Textron, Lockheed Martin, ACS and Burlington Northern Santa Fe."

The Web site designs are expected also to be more than cosmetic. Students will develop applications that will increase the functionality of the site, such as enabling

them to link to various internal and external databases. TCU will host the sites for the spring semester, but non-profits will be required to purchase their domain names and find outside hosting services. The complete project is scheduled for an April delivery date after the team presents the results to the non-profit representative and class. ♦
