

J. Broadus James, Grandview, Route 4; F. O. James, Ft. Worth; Mrs. W. A. Shirley, Venus (husband runs a gin; Mrs.          Bush, a widow, formerly near Meridian; a younger daughter who lived with the father till his death, but is of unsound mind, now at Terrell; Mrs. Louis Lancaster, who lives north of Alvarado (Bradley's Gin?)--turn right at gin, go along a dirt road 1 or  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles, and in a house off to the left, or inquire at gin; were the children or some of the children of John James, the man who had the meteorite. Above information from Dell (D. Y.) Schultz, Postmaster.

J. F. Pardue runs the newspaper, and remembers seeing the meteorite. *He was impressed by its weight, + thinks it was as large as a man's head. In another place I have his initials as C. F. The paper is the "Alvarado Bulletin".*
