I realize how busy you are and how little time you have for reading, on the other hand we are extremely interested in a few problems enumerated in the clippings attached, namely:

"Enforcement of OPA Meat Highs Broken"  
"Oil Shows Need of New OPA Policy"  
"Objections to Federal Health Control"

The latter being our objections to compulsory health insurance and medical service bill. This health control bill is a piece of asinity personified. Why in the h--- don't the Administration and Congress leave matters of this kind to the control of the States. Pretty soon we can not go out in the back lot without asking teacher - the teacher of course would be living in Washington. If the Administration would stop agitating the poll tax bill, FEPC bill, slash the hell out of the federal payroll, let labor and industry handle their own affairs, we would be a lot better off.
