Roosevelt Given Suit Woven of Texas Wool

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—A suit of clothes made from Texas-grown wool

was presented to President Roosevelt Tuesday by L. W. Robert Jr., Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, and Amon G. Carter, Fort Worth, shortly before the President left for Hyde Park for a week of rest. The presentation was on behalf of the Texas Technological College at Lubbock, the wool having been grown on the 2,000-acre campus farm of the institution.

The wool was processed in the technical engineering department of the college. The material for the clothing was machine woven on college equipment. However, the college has designed and constructed a number of hand looms suitable for community or individual farm home use in weaving similar cloth. The college is fostering home manufacture of textiles, according to Carter.
