NATIONAL PUBLIC RADIO (NPR) POLITICAL analyst and legal affairs consultant Nina Totenberg will speak on campus Jan. 24 at 6 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The event will be free and open to the public.

NPR received the prestigious Peabody Award for Totenberg's coverage of Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas' hearing on sexual harassment allegations from Anita Hill. Totenberg received many awards for the same coverage including the Long Island University George Polk Award for excellence in journalism, the Sigma Delta Chi Award from the Society of Professional Journalists and the prestigious Joan S. Barone Award for excellence in Washington-based national affairs/public policy reporting.

A frequent contributor to major newspapers and periodicals, she has published articles in *The New York Times Magazine*, *The Harvard Law Review*, *The Christian Science Monitor*, *Parade* magazine, *New York Magazine* and more. ♦

Tandy Center hosting new executive coaching program

CERTIFICATION FOR EXECUTIVE COACHING has arrived, and the Tandy Center for Executive Leadership, a division of the Neeley School, is offering the first section Jan. 23-24, and the remainder in February and March.

The Sherpa Executive Coaching certification program will be taught by Judith Colemon, co-founder of Sherpa Coaching LLC, a Cincinnati-based consulting firm. She and Brenda Corbett are the authors of *The Sherpa Guide: Process-Driven Executive Coaching*. Together, they have coached and/or certified executives for General Electric, FedEx, IBM, Johnson & Johnson and Toyota, among others.

The Neeley School is the first to offer this program in Texas. The course is also being offered at the University of Louisville, Penn State, Kent State and the University of Cincinnati.

"Coaching even one key executive in an organization can change lives for the better for the hundreds of people who report to that executive," says Colemon.

"Executive coaching is in high demand, and a qualified designation such as Sherpa certification assures a successful experience and outcome," says **Deb Baker**, director of executive development for the Tandy Center.
