ment is Intense.

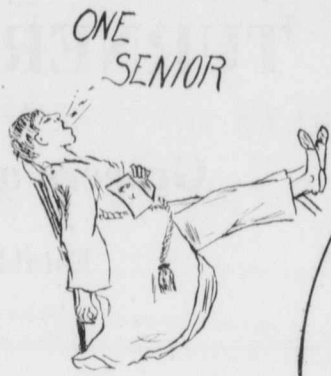

NEW PRINCIPLE IS DISCOVERED BY TEXAS SCIENTIST

Foreigners Marvel at Work of
Dr. Stiles, Noted T. C. U.
Chemistry Expert.

EFFECT FAR REACHING

Claimed That Principle Recently
Unearthed Will Revolutionize Science.

Berlin, Jan. 25.—That a new field for scientific exploration has been opened up by a recent startling discovery made at Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, Texas, U. S. A., is the opinion of German scientists. This discovery, which, as stated, will have far-reaching influence, was made in the laboratories of that institution by Mr. Cecil Stiles, a fellow in chemistry. Briefly stated, and stripped of the scientific and technical terms which scientists use in speaking of his discovery, Mr. Stiles has demonstrated (found out suddenly) that hydrogen, when brought into contact with substances heated to a sufficient degree, will produce a "near-explosion."

Acting upon these vague discoveries made by Mr. Stiles, a noted German scientist, Dr. R. Brunier, of the University of Berlin, has today revealed what many determined a "freakish" discovery. With typical German thoroughness, he has made the disclosure proof-positive. By the aid of a pure essence of candle flame he has rendered hydrogen capable of combustion. Of course, delicate machinery was used for the operation, but by his system he finds that simple contact brings about the said combustion. Dr. Brunier is not ready at this time to give to the scientific world a complete explanation, but further explorations are pending at the university in the new field of discovery and it is to be hoped that still other revelations will emerge from his study of hydrogen.

IS THE BIBLE FOR OR AGAINST CLASS RUSHES?

Noted Educator Raises Mooted
Question at Noted Institu-
tion of Learning.

REFERENCES CONFLICT

Discussion Promises to Wax
Warm and Have Great In-
fluence on College Sports.

Chicago, Jan. 24.—That class rushes in our modern colleges are not only a relic of barbarism, an offense to culture and refinement, but are distinctly prohibited by the Bible, as well, was the statement made today by Dr. S. Q. Eamish, lecturer in the Higher Criticism of Nature Faking in the University of Ogacilic. "It is only after much research and weighing of evidence that I have arrived at this conclusion," the Doctor continued. "But after carefully weighing the evidence, my decision is firm and unalterable that these functions, permitted at many of our institutions of higher learning, should be prohibited. I say prohibited advisedly, young gentlemen, for it would be against the spirit of the quotations I shall tender in proof, if these functions should be ruthlessly crushed down with an iron heel. Rather, I would advise that at these benighted institutions where this practice flourishes, the faculty should substitute an annual pink tea, or reception, whereat the lower class could sit together at a peanut butter banquet, and afterward, perhaps, indulge in a contest of sonnet writing, or the cheering, exciting game of authors. This would open their hearts to the beneficent influence of the spirit of brotherly love, so well exemplified by the unimpeachable politeness of two Frenchmen, Messrs. Alphonse and Gaston."

"In proof that this trouble (class rushes), or a similar one, existed in the days of the prophets and the apostles, I will offer the following quotations," Dr. Eamish continued. "To the Freshmen, especially, I would say: 'In quietness be your strength.' (Isa. 30:15.) To the Sophomore, 'Wisdom is peaceable.' (Jas. 3:17.) To both, the injunction in Acts 19:36, 'Ye ought to be quiet, and do nothing rashly,' is excellently applicable. Again, evidently referring
