TCU conducting self study

TCU IS CURRENTLY in the process of conducting an athletics certification self study.

The process, which is required by the NCAA, is designed to take a comprehensive look at TCU's athletic program and to reaffirm the commitment to rules compliance by assessing, reviewing and making any necessary changes in athletic department policy or practice.

Other objectives of the study are to educate the university about the athletic program, make recommendations on how to improve the program, identify the program's strengths and weaknesses and to achieve full certification by the NCAA.

The study aims to achieve these objectives by opening up affairs of athletics to the university community and the public, by setting standards for division I programs and by placing tough sanctions on institutions who fail to correct any identified problems.

Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Don Mills is chairman of the self study committee and said the areas the committee is focusing on are governance, academics, finances and equity in the athletics program. By assessing these areas the committee will help the NCAA ensure its commitment to integrity in intercollegiate athletics.

Don also said TCU is currently in the process of data collection for the study and because of the scope of the process, many campus offices will be asked to provide data. Anyone who is not contacted and would like to offer input may do so at an open hearing to be held in the future. ♦
