419 Vote In Election

Haggard, Matthews, Becker, Swiley, Reynolds, Black Elected

Four hundred and nineteen students went to the polls on Wednesday and named Progressive Party candidates to seven of the nine Student Council posts voted on.

Only Progressive choices to lose were Miss Martha Fallis, who lost the secretary-treasurer's race to Miss Janis Stephens 182 to 238, and Clarice Rumph, who was beaten by Walter (Pete) Becker 127 to 286 for Council place No. 3.

Closest race of the day was staged between James Matthews and Landon Colquitt for place No. 2. The former won out 215 to 194.

Biggest margin of victory went to Buster Reynolds, winner of place No. 5, who beat Harry Stiefel 342 to 67. I. B. Hale won over Miss Frances Wand in the vice-president's race 320 to 89.

Results in other votes were: Miss Emmajean Haggard defeated Miss Miriam Glaze 283 to 129 in the race for place No. 1.

Tom Swiley swamped W. O. Dewees 307 to 101 for place No. 4.

William Arthur Black beat George Stroud 247 to 161 for place No. 6.

Guy Daniel for president, Ernest Peyton for editor of The Skiff and Jack Murphy for head yell leader were elected without opposition.

This gives a Council line-up thus far, with class posts to be elected May 4, of seven Progressives and two independents. The Council also has seven dorm and two town students thus far.

"We are exceedingly happy," said Vincent "Boss" Ziegler, head of the new party, when informed of the results. "Stephens and Becker are wise choices. Still believing that Rumph's position at Service Drug is worthy of representation, we shall submit his name for the sophomore Council post. May this Council have at all times solid student support."

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Track Men Beat Bears

Clifford, Hall, Erwin Lead Frogs to Victory in Only Home Meet

Scoring heavily, 26 points, in the eight events and javelin, Coach Clark's track and field team tied up far more tallies than they needed to defeat the Baylor Bears in a dual meet staged on the Frog field this afternoon. The final score was Frogs 96, Baylor 40.

The Purple jumped into a lead in the first event and were ahead all times, winning 13 of the 16 events. Pat Clifford paced his team to victory with 14 1/4 points in high point honors of the meet. The red-headed speedster won the hurdles in a thrilling duel with Baylor's star timber-topper, Cotton Kimbriel. Clifford also took part in the broad jump, second in high hurdles and ran a leg on the 440-yard relay team.

Less than two points behind was versatile Johnny Hall who copped the 220-yard dash, got second in the century, scored in two weights and ran on the 440-yard and one mile relay teams.

Gail Smith took both the quarter and half mile races with some brilliant running and ran a beautiful leg on the one mile relay.

Probably the outstanding performance of the day was turned in by Lee Dunivant who broke the school pole vault record by clearing the bar at 12 feet nine inches. Puss Erwin continued to show his supremacy in the weights by taking both the shot put and discus events.

The freshman teams of the Purple and Baylor finished in a tie with 33 points. Up until the final event, the broad jump, Baylor was leading but eight points in this event scored by Robert Goselose and Floyd McRoberts pulled the Wogs even with the Cubs.

Netmen Beat Trinity For First Victory

The Frog netters have finally broken into the win column! They trounced the Trinity Tigers to the tune of 5-1 at Waxahachie Tuesday afternoon. Tom Swiley was the only Frog to lose, being bested in his No. 3 singles match.

What proved to be the highlight of the matches was Capt. Bobby Bass's three-set victory at the No. 1 singles hole. Bass exhibited the best form he has unworked this season. Swiley and Bass teamed to win the No. 1 doubles match, in three sets.

Walter Bradley played No. 2, and Joe Russo filled the No. 4 position. They then teamed in doubles. The Frogs were less fortunate in their encounter with the ETEX Teachers on the home courts Monday. The outcome of the scheduled matches was 5-1 in favor of the Teachers. Oddly enough, Swiley was the only Frog to win in this series. Two practice matches were played also, and the Frogs split these, winning one and losing one.

Joe Russo, also from Flushing, N.Y., will remain here for the holidays.

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Frogs Second In 4-Way Meet

"The boys looked pretty good!" That one statement, coming from Coach Puss Clark, sums up the Frogs' performance in finishing in second place at Austin Saturday in a quadrangular meet with Texas, Baylor and S. M. U.

The Frogs copped only one first, but won enough second, third and fourth places to score 41 points, which was more than twice as much as third place Baylor and last place S. M. U. tallied.

Puss Erwin came through as expected and took first place honors in the shot put. He also grabbed runnerup position in the discus and ran a leg of the Frogs' second place 440-yard relay team. Johnny Hall was the "iron man" of the day. Hall competed in six events and scored in five. He finished second in the 440-yard dash, third in the 220, third in the discus, ran on the sprint relay team and turned in a brilliant 49.8 quarter on the one mile relay.

Capt. Pat Clifford placed in both hurdle events, the broad jump and ran on the sprint relay quartet.

Up and coming Gail Smith had tough luck in the 880-yard run. He was leading the field all of the way, but got off of his timing and was nosed out in a close finish.

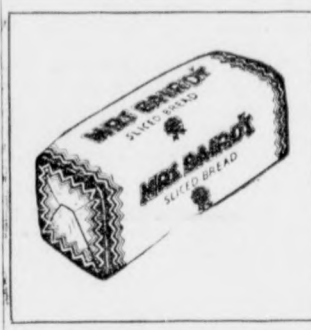
