University policies in place to protect personal information of faculty, staff and students

AS PART OF TCU'S COMMITMENT TO protecting the privacy and security of your personal information, SPI (sensitive and personal information) policies have been created. SPI is defined as an individual's name, address or telephone number combined with their social security number, credit/debit card numbers, salary data, driver's license number, date of birth, medical information protected by HIPAA, or student related data protected by FERPA.

It is University policy that such private information will not be disclosed except as required by University procedures or legal government requirements. Please visit <http://security.tcu.edu/SecuringSPI.doc> to learn how best to handle sensitive documents and data.

In addition, to ensure that the seriousness of this policy is understood, all faculty/staff and students will be required to electronically sign a Statement of Responsibility for Sensitive Personal Information each year. Effective 02/14/06, this policy will be presented to you when logging into my.tcu.edu once each year. You will be requested to select an "I Accept" checkbox after reading the statement that will be recorded as your legal signature.

Another privacy protection step was taken last week with the modification of the online Frog Calls directory. It will now display only the name, e-mail address and department of faculty and staff. The more detailed directory, listing data such as work and home addresses and telephone numbers will be secured behind the portal (my.tcu.edu). Those outside the campus community can use the e-mail addresses to make contact with faculty and staff.

Faculty/staff can restrict the information displayed within the internal portal by clicking on the [Employee Self-Service](#) tab, then select [Personal Information](#) and open [View Personal Information](#). Scroll down the page and check the [Do Not Publish](#) option. ♦

Richard M. Ingersoll will discuss teacher shortages at Thursday lecture

EDUCATION EXPERT DR. RICHARD M. Ingersoll will speak at the economics department's Green Chair public lecture at 5:30 p.m. Thursday at the Kelly Center. His topic is "The Teacher Shortage: A Case of Wrong Diagnosis and Wrong Prescription."

A teacher in both public and private schools for many years, Ingersoll has focused his research on the character of elementary and secondary schools as workplaces, teachers as employees and teaching as an occupation. He has published a number of articles and reports on the management and organization of schools, the debate over school accountability, the status of teaching as a profession and the impact of centralization and decentralization on school performance.

Ingersoll has received national recognition and numerous awards for his work, including the 2004 Outstanding Writing Award from the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education for his book *Who Controls Teachers'*

RAD is a comprehensive program of realistic, self-defense tactics and techniques for women that begins with awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance. The curriculum progresses to the basics of hands-on defense training.

Classes are held over a two-day period, with the next session scheduled for 1 to 7 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 18 - 19, in the University Recreation Center, multipurpose room #2. Workbooks and other materials are provided.
