## TCU Alumni Association awards will lead off Homecoming/Reunion events

THE TCU ALUMNI ASSOCIATION WILL present its 1999 alumni awards at a reception and dinner at 6:45 p.m. Nov. 11 at River Crest Country Club. Tickets to the black tie-optional event are \$50.

Honorees include Ann Crawford McClure '74 of El Paso; Jerry J. Ray '58 of Austin; Malcolm K. Brachman of Dallas; E.M. and Rosalyn Rosenthal of Fort Worth; Kyle Clifton '91 of Aledo; Garner L. Wilde '50 of Midland; and Jason B. Illian '99 of Milwaukee, Wis.

The Alumni Awards dinner is the first event of 1999 Homecoming/Reunion Weekend.

McClure, who will receive the Distinguished Alumna Award, is associate justice of the Eighth District Court of Appeals in El Paso and a key figure in Texas family law.

Ray, a Trustee since 1994, will be presented the Valuable Alumnus Award for his outstanding and continuous service to both the University and the Alumni Association. Proud of his family's longtime involvement with TCU, it has been exactly 100 years since his grandfather, James Joshua Ray, was captain of the AddRan College football team.

Brachman, a longtime Trustee, will receive the Honorary Alumnus Award. Although a graduate of Yale and Harvard, a former professor at SMU and board member at several educational institutions, involvement with TCU runs in Dr. Brachman's family, even though no immediate members attended. Brachman Hall is named for his parents, the late Etta and Solomon Brachman, and his father also

was a TCU Trustee.

The Royal Purple Award will go to the Rosenthals, honoring the couple for their support of TCU along with a lifelong tradition of philanthropy for Jewish causes, the arts and education. They made the lead gift to endow the Chair for Judaic Studies which led to the inauguration of TCU's new program in Jewish Studies. They also have provided the naming gift for the Rosalyn and Manny Rosenthal Soccer Stadium which will be dedicated in the spring.

Clifton, who lettered in football here between 1981 and 1983, still holds two TCU records...most tackles in one season and most tackles in a single game. Drafted by the New York Jets, he spent 13 years as a pro defensive standout. Clifton will receive the Frog O' Fame Award.

TCU has no stronger advocate than Dr. Wilde, who will be presented with the Alumni Service Award. Distinguished in the field of geology and known for his work within the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Dr. Wilde has been active with TCU alumni on the local and national levels and a staunch supporter of Horned Frog football.

Recent graduate Illian captured the national spotlight when he was named to the *USA Today* Collegiate All-American Team last year. He will be given the Distinguished Student Award, yet another acknowledgement of excellence both in the classroom and on the football field. He is now a professional money manager in Milwaukee.
