Dear Mr Carter:

This to thank you for letting me talk with you yesterday. Please know I understand the conditions under which you did it.

Mr Ort who modeled the clay bust of Will Rogers is having difficulty in working out plans to have it cast. It seems it is too intricate to have it done anywhere in this part of the country. If it is sent east for this purpose it will cost several hundred dollars. We are now trying to work out something on this. He will be glad to bring the model in for you to see. I suggested to him that he wait until you return in May. Please communicate with him for details. You may address him: Mr William Ort, 1605 Kemp St., Wichita Falls, Texas. In the meantime I shall make a copy of his biographical sketch which appears in "Art and Artists of Texas" for your files.

May I take this opportunity of telling you of the kindly feeling I have toward your paper and Mr Benson, Literary Editor. Three years ago when I lived in Ft Worth I started writing book reviews. I was told it was a thankless job. I kept on writing reviews. The Star-Telegram published the first review I ever wrote. Then for a time they were unable to include them. I found other outlets, some good, and some not so good. A few months ago I had a review which I thought particularly good so I sent it to Mr Benson and to my surprise it was published. And to my greater surprise it was paid for! This was the first remuneration I had received for a review after writing three-hundred of them. Since that time my reviews have been appearing in the Star-Telegram on the average of one a week. I have other outlets in state papers but only use them when I get "scooped" as they pay nothing. I am capable of producing 1500 words of saleable review copy per week.

Concerning the Bryant episode I have no ill feelings. It's just one of those things. It was'nt the first time I had been turned down, by any means.
