## Brite's first Campbell-Randle Lectureships set for Oct. 29 in chapel

BRITE DIVINITY SCHOOL has announced the inaugural Mark W. and Dorothy Campbell Randle Lectureships for Oct. 29 in Robert Carr Chapel.

Dr. William R. Baird, emeritus professor of New Testament at Brite, will speak on "Faith and Reason in Biblical Scholarship" at 11 a.m. Dr. M. Eugene Boring, the I. Wylie and Elizabeth M. Briscoe professor of New Testament at Brite, will discuss "Faith and Reason in Disciples Interpretation of the Bible" at 12:15 p.m. A complimentary buffet lunch will be served between sessions in Weatherly Hall.

These lectureships have been funded by the Rev. Dr. Mark Randle and his wife, Dorothy Campbell Randle, to celebrate the Disciples of Christ contributions to the issues of "faith and reason," TCU and Brite's church relatedness and the importance of lay leadership in church life. After more than 50 years of service to Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) congregations, the couple recently retired and are living in Fort Worth.

Dr. and Mrs. Randle grew up in the First Christian Churches of Lockhart and Taylor, respectively, and it is those two entities and their families' strong commitment to them that they credit with having the greatest influence on their lives. ♦

Before it belonged to TCU, Worth Hills was a city golf course until the early 1960s. It was a legacy that lasted since golfers have continued to enjoy using the wide open spaces as an informal "driving range."

The intervening years have brought residence halls, the soccer field, tennis center, football practice field and, most recently, the concrete path for jogging and walking. Between the people, the parked cars and the traffic along Bellaire Drive, the potential danger to individuals and

property bombarded by golf balls has been a concern to the administration for some time. ♦
