Green Chair nominations announced for this year

A NUMBER OF PROMINENT SCHOLARS will be on campus this year as visiting Green Honors Professors... a program established by Drs. Cecil H. and Ida Green of Dallas.

The economics department will host Dr. James K. Galbraith, professor of public affairs and government at the University of Texas at Austin, for lectures here Nov. 18-19. He holds degrees from Harvard and Yale and studied economics as a Marshall Scholar at King's College, Cambridge and served in several positions on the staff of the U.S. Congress, including executive director of the Joint Economic Committee. He is national chairman of the Economists' Committee for a Decent Minimum Wage.

Dr. Tom Blenkinsop will be the guest of the geology department in late spring.

The Englishman is a member of the geology faculty at the University of Zimbabwe and is widely recognized for his work in structural geology.

The political science department has invited Dr. Susan J. Carroll to participate in the annual TCU Women's Symposium March 29-30. She is a member of the Center for Women and Politics of the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers University.

The School of Education has invited Stuart L. Brown, M.D., as its Green Chair nominee. Dr. Brown has a distinguished career in psychiatric medicine and is a recognized authority on the role of play and creativity in the prevention of violence.

The College of Fine Arts and Communication will have renowned composer Marlos Nobre of Brazil as its Green Chair lecturer and keynote speaker for the Latin American Music Festival in mid-April. He is one of the top Latin American composers living today.

Dr. Linda L. Putnam has accepted the invitation from the speech communication department and will be here to lecture Oct. 18-21. She is a professor of speech communication at Texas A&M University.

The honors program will host Dr. Robert Pinsky, current poet laureate of the United States, as Green Honors Professor and Honors Week speaker April 11-15.

He is a professor of English at Boston University. ♦

companies anchored in the Alliance development. The facility, currently under construction, is scheduled to open in mid-October.

"TCUglobalcenter turns the traditional education model on its head. Instead of designing a traditional, prepared regimen of courses and faculty that we 'sell' to the community, we will design our programs in response to the demand of our constituents. We won't be limited to the traditional Monday through Friday, September through May academic year. Our constituents will shape our campus," said **Kirk Downey**, associate provost and executive director of TCUglobalcenter at Alliance.

TCUglobalcenter at Alliance will be located in 16,000 square feet of space on the ground floor at Heritage Commons, also the division offices of Hillwood, the developer of Alliance. The facility will feature a 72-person, state-of-the-art tiered classroom; two 30-person classrooms; two large conference rooms; and "teaming areas," flexible meeting/classroom spaces that can be configured at will to suit the individual needs of the group. A 2,000-square-foot reception area and marketing center will be occupied jointly by TCU and Hillwood to showcase their facilities and

programs. Fort Worth-based architects GideonToal created the modernistic design.

TCUglobalcenter will staff five full-time employees, including Kirk, two professional staff and two clerical staff. All faculty will be contracted on an as-needed basis. TCU will be the primary source for faculty, according to Kirk, but faculty may be contracted from other universities in the area and around the country to meet specialized instructional needs.

"Building stronger partnerships with the community was one of the ten objectives I outlined when I arrived at TCU last summer. This announcement is one giant leap toward achieving that goal. TCU is committed to serving the needs of the broader population in Tarrant County, and will continue to explore opportunities for community partnerships that expand our reach in meaningful ways," said **Chancellor Michael R. Ferrari**.

Now celebrating its 10th anniversary, Alliance houses more than 70 companies, including 21 from the Fortune 500. The 9,600-acre development is anchored by the world's first industrial airport in north Fort Worth.

STAGE WEST AND SHAKESPEARE IN THE Park have announced their first combined season under the name Allied Theatre Group. The two companies will officially merge Oct. 1, just before the season opening Oct. 8.

This premiere season includes nine plays, seven at Stage West and two at Shakespeare in the Park.

The Stage West season opens next month with Thornton Wilder's brilliant vision of American life, *Our Town*. In November, Joe Orton's outrageous comedy *Loot* is scheduled. Anna Deavere Smith's *Fires in the Mirror* will follow in January, starring Be Boyd of the TCU theatre faculty. Shakespeare's *Macbeth* is on tap for February.

April at Stage West will bring the Alan Ayckbourn comedy *Man of the Moment*. The next production is the alternately comic and touching New York hit *Visiting Mr. Green*, starring Stage West founder Jerry Russell in the title role. The season closes with a celebration of the life of an extraordinary woman: *Pride's Crossing* by Tina Howe.

At Shakespeare in the Park, the summer festival season will present *King Lear*, followed by *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.

As with Stage West and SITP season tickets in the past, Allied Theatre Group season subscribers will have great flexibility in using their admissions. There will be no dates or seats to choose in advance, and season tickets may be used for up to two admissions for any play. ♦
