Journalism department teams with *Star-Telegram* to bolster teen journalists

YOUNG JOURNALISTS WILL GAIN valuable experience beyond their high school classrooms that will prepare them for careers in journalism, thanks to a unique partnership between the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and TCU's department of journalism. The goal of the Fort Worth Journalism Project is to encourage teenagers, especially minority students, in the 13 high schools in the Fort Worth ISD to consider careers in mass communications.

The Fort Worth Journalism Project exposes both high school students and journalism advisers to working practitioners, professional work environments and additional resources. Activities include a speaker's bureau of reporters, editors and faculty; workshops for school newspaper advisers; short-term internships for high school editors through the TCU Daily Skiff; and a student contest with categories including feature writing, sports writing, opinion writing and photo journalism.

The Fort Worth Journalism Project also will choose a top student each year as the Fort Worth High School Journalist of the Year. The winner will receive a 10-week paid summer internship at the *Star-Telegram*.

With school budgets tightening around high school journalism programs, **Tommy Thomason** (journalism, chair) recognizes the value of providing services and resources to high schools. "High school journalism is one of the best ways we know to develop skills in information-gathering, writing and critical thinking. This project is designed to work with journalism teachers and publications advisers to give them more of the tools they need to succeed in their work," he said.

Tommy conceived of the idea for the expanded partnership with the Star-Telegram after working with Star-Telegram reporters and editors during TCU's annual, two-week Urban Journalism Workshop for minority students interested in journalism.

Don Mills to receive national award in Ohio

VICE CHANCELLOR **DON MILLS** (student affairs) will be honored by the North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) during its national meeting Saturday in Columbus, OH. He will receive the organization's Silver Medal in recognition of his two years as chair of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Fraternity and Sorority Network.

Past Silver Medal recipients include Bob and Elizabeth Dole, Sen. Bob Livingston and President George Bush.

NIC was founded in 1909 and has 66 member organizations with 5,500 chapters on 800 U.S. and Canadian campuses.

Earlier this year, Don became a recipient of NASPA's "Pillar of the Profession" Award, presented at the annual national conference in Boston. NASPA, which has more than 8,000 members at 1,175 campuses, is the leading voice for student affairs administration, policy and practice.

Don has been at TCU for 28 years, serving in a variety of positions including director of housing and associate vice chancellor before being named to his current post in 1994. A graduate of Harvard University, he received advanced degrees from TCU and UNT. ◆
