Filing Date In Elections Is Scheduled

Filing date for the fall elections has been set for tomorrow. Prospective candidates may pick up filing forms and copies of the election rules at the Information Desk of the Student Center any time three days prior to the filing meeting.

At 5 p.m. tomorrow, two weeks prior to the primary, all candidates will meet in the Student Center Ballroom. At this time each candidate shall present his filing form to the election committee chairman. Also, the election committee chairman shall distribute copies of the election procedure and explain election rules fully. Every candidate must be present or have a representative at the meeting.

Candidates shall be required to pay a \$10 filing fee. This fee will be refunded at the termination of the election to candidates who complied with all election rules. Failure to comply with the rules shall result in disqualification of the candidate and in loss of the filing fee.

The candidates shall be requested to submit six two by three inch pictures of himself to the election committee at the time of the filing meeting. These will be used in the official publicity put out by the election committee. This is not mandatory, but the pictures must be included in each candidate's expense account.

Each class will elect a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. Freshmen also will choose four class representatives. All classes will vote for the 1959 Homecoming Queen.

Only the class presidents and the freshman class representatives will be members of Student Congress. Class presidents must have a minimum of a 2.2 grade point index overall and on the last long semester, and the freshman class representatives must not be on academic probation.

The Homecoming Queen must have completed a minimum of 73 hours and must have a minimum of a 2.0 grade point index on the last long semester. Nominations for Homecoming Queen can be made Oct. 7, 8 and 9. There

Final Registration Figures Decline, But Set Records

Although final registration figures will not be available until Oct. 5, and it is now certain that while the total enrollment will show a slight decline, several new records have been set.

For the fourth straight fall, enrollment has passed the 6,000 mark. This fall's mark stands at 6,205, a decrease of 285 over last fall's 6,474.

A torchlight parade is planned for Thursday night at 7. The parade will begin in front of the Student Center and will end in a pep rally in front of the Milton Daniel Dormitory. Everyone is urged to come and boost the team to victory in their first conference game.

New records have been established in the day school undergraduate division, in Graduate School and for an entering freshman class. Decreases were reported in Evening College and Brite College of the Bible.

Graduate School registered an all-time high of 520, an increase of 36 over last year's 484.

Brite College of the Bible, the graduate seminary, showed a decrease of 10 students at 146.

Evening College, showing the most noticeable decline had a registration of 1717. This is a decrease of 428 below last fall's 2145. It is possible that late registration will bring this mark up some.

Leuty Heads Army ROTC

Cadet Lt. Col. Ray S. Leuty, Fort Worth senior, has been appointed cadet commander of Army ROTC.

Leuty is a business administration major, and during his four years as an ROTC cadet he has received the Association of the United States Army award and the Army Superior Cadet medal.

Appointed as Battle Group Deputy Commander was student body president Jerry Johnson, Arlington Heights Ill., senior. He will hold the rank of Cadet Major. Johnson, who has received the Sons of the American Revolution Award and the Chicago Tribune Award, is a two year member of the varsity golf team.

Other appointments are: Cadet Maj. Donald R. Carlson, personnel, Cadet Capt. Russell G. Pynes, Information, Cadet Capt. Felix P. McGaughy, Jr., training, Cadet Capt. Fred E. McCown, supply, "A" Company Commander, Cadet Capt. James D. Petty, Jr., "B" Company Commander, Cadet Capt. Donald L. Williams, "C" Company Commander, Cadet Capt. Joe Mofett, and "D" Company Commander, Cadet Capt. George Jones.

As of 10 a.m. Saturday, Registrar Calvin Cumbie reported there were 3,822 undergraduates enrolled in the day colleges. This is an increase of 133 over last fall.

An all-time mark was registered for an entering freshman class. This record is 918, an increase of 63.

"The figures are quite satisfactory to me," said Chancellor Sadler. "I'm not too much concerned about having an enormous enrollment. I am concerned about having the enrollment reasonably balanced."

Testing Conference Planned

Applications are being accepted until Nov. 1 for some 900 Fulbright scholarships for study or research in 28 countries. Inter-American Cultural Convention awards for study in 17 Latin American countries have the same filing deadline.

Recipients of Fulbright awards for study in Europe, Latin America and the Asia-Pacific areas will receive tuition, maintenance and round-trip travel expenses.

General eligibility requirements are (1) U.S. citizenship at time of application; (2) A bachelor's degree or its equivalent by 1960; (3) Knowledge of the language of the host country and (4) Good health. A demonstrated capacity for independent study and a good academic record are also necessary. Preference is given to applicants under 35 years of

age who have not previously lived or studied abroad.

Applicants will be required to submit a plan of proposed study that can be carried out profitably within the year abroad. Successful candidates are required to be affiliated with approved institutions of higher learning abroad.

Competitions for the 1960-61 academic year close Nov. 1, 1959. Requests for application forms must be postmarked before Oct. 15. Applications may be obtained from the regional office at 401 Milam Bldg., Houston 2, Texas. Completed applications must be submitted by Nov. 1.

Cannibal or Clothier

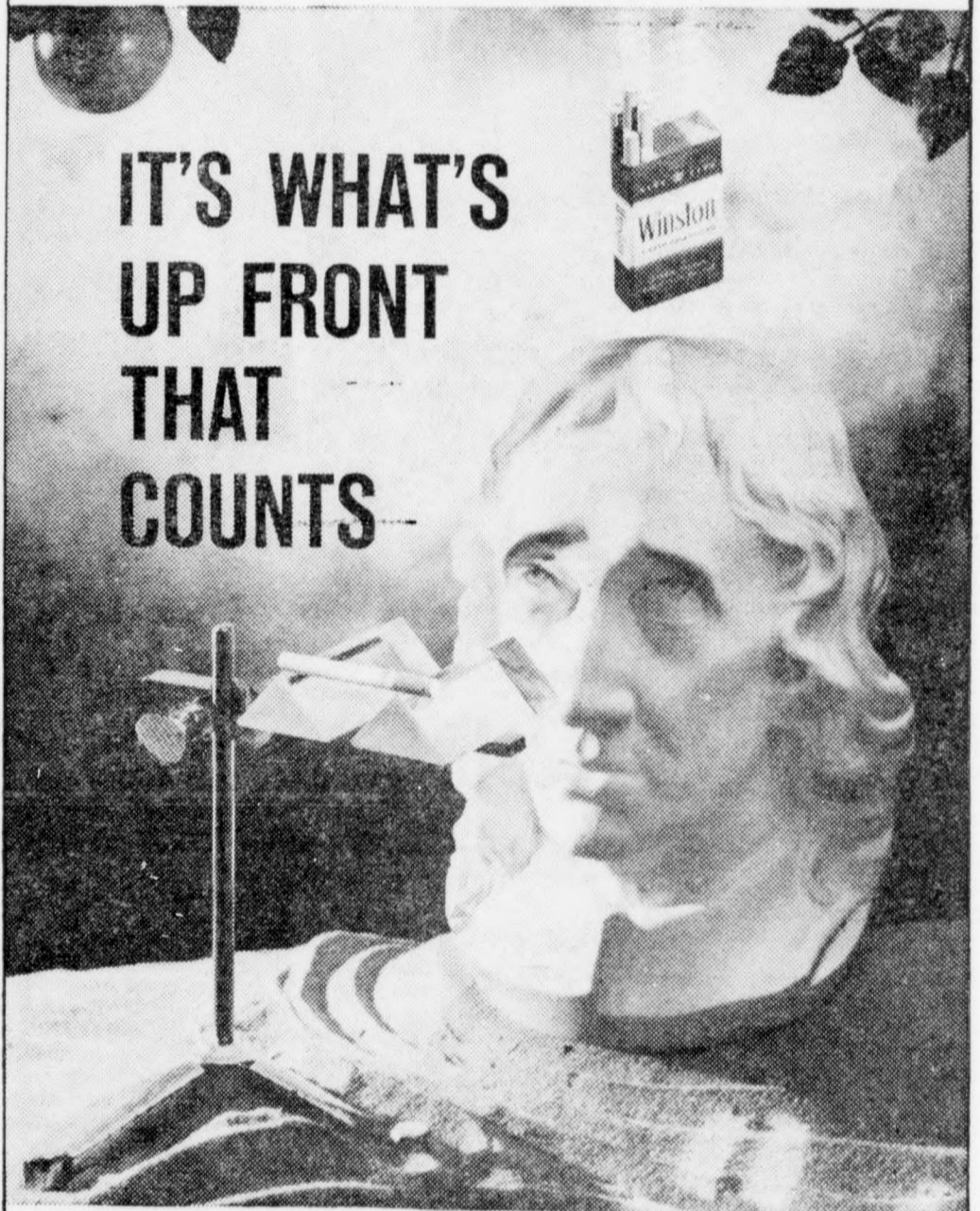

From Ceylon to Fort Worth

Prof Arrives, Suitcase in Hand

Dr. Leo Baggerly, who formerly lectured at Ceylon University, is the newest member of the physics staff. While at the University of Ceylon, Dr. Baggerly was on a Fulbright scholarship that lasted three years because of his outstanding work on the International Geophysical Year.

During his three-year stay in Ceylon, Dr. Baggerly lectured to civic and high school science clubs and worked on the continuous recording of the cosmic ray in addition to his work on the IGY.

The university classes in Ceylon are conducted in English, and students gain entrance to the university according to the scores they make on entrance exams.

Dr. Baggerly pointed out that

the curriculum at the University of Ceylon is quite different from ours. There, a physics major would take only courses related to physics and no liberal arts would be studied. He believes that this extreme specialization is not good because the student is not prepared for complex modern society.

In addition to his other activities, Dr. Baggerly sponsored the Student Christian Movement, one of the four major religious groups at the university. One of the group's favorite discussion topics was parent-arranged marriages. Dr. Baggerly said that most students favored these marriages because society did not prepare them for choosing a mate.

The purpose of the Fulbright program is to help to further

understanding among the nations that participate in this program. Dr. Baggerly believes that the usual one-year scholarship is insufficient time for the student to become acquainted with the profession. He believes that his three-year stay in Ceylon enabled him to accomplish the purpose of the program.

The new physics professor has been trying to cope with the problem of living out of a suitcase since arriving in this country. Due to a dock strike in Ceylon that occurred as he prepared to leave that country, all of his family's belongings had to be stored for the duration of the strike. Now that the strike is over, his baggage is en route to Fort Worth and should arrive before Thanksgiving.

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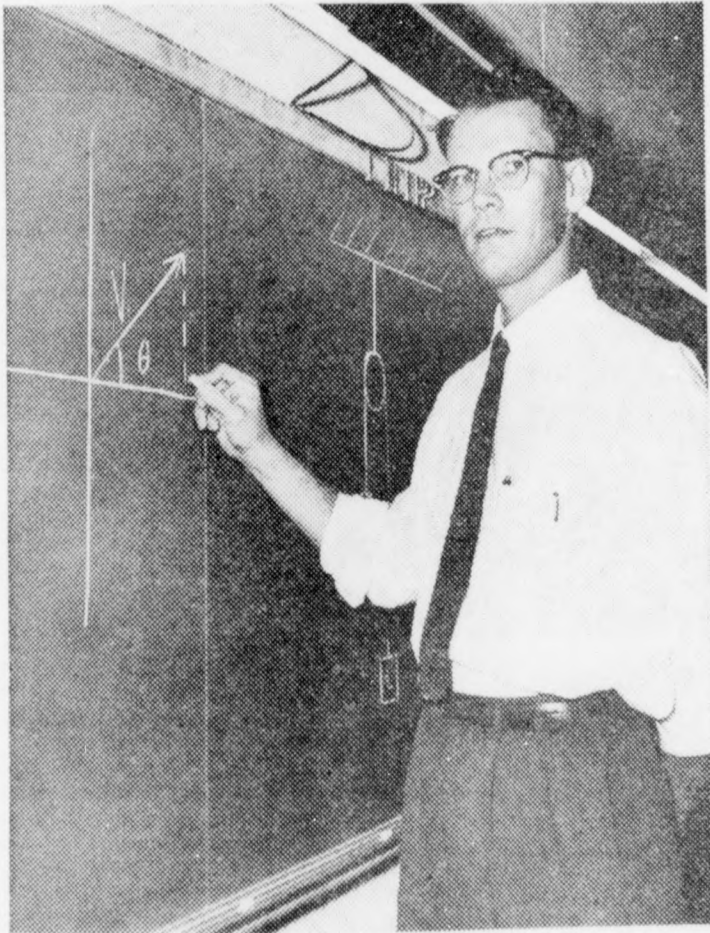

"Those people are crazy, picking SMU to win the Southwest Conference when TCU has a team like it does."

Such were the words of Max Fulger, LSU's All-America center, who is a cinch to repeat with the honors this year.

"That was one of the hardest games I've ever played. I don't think we will ever play a tighter game," he went on to say.

Fulger was full of praise for the Frog team, pointing out Don Floyd and Robert Lilly for their outstanding performances.

"That Floyd is really a great football player. He played a real fine game. He hits you harder every time he goes after you.

"And what's that other tackle's name, Lilly? Man, that son of a gun is as big as a mountain. He's one of the biggest football players I've ever seen."

According to Fulger, Billy Cannon can run the 100-yard dash in 9.4 seconds and will travel to the upcoming Olympic trials to compete in the 60-yard event.

Fulger went on to say Cannon would have made a touchdown on an intercepted pass, late in the fourth quarter, had it not been for a pulled leg muscle.

As Fulger continued, it became obvious Cannon could run the hundred in less than ten seconds with both legs broken.

Speaking of rudeness, it was quite a shock and made many TCU students bitter when the LSU student body booed the TCU team and gave a school yell during the alma matter. Their team may be number one but their hospitality is number zero.

FROGS FAVORED TO DOWN HOGS

The Purple clansmen travel to Hogland Friday with the intention of righting the wrong done them in 1957.

The Frogs will have some tough competition at Fayetteville the following afternoon, in their first conference tilt of the season, since the Razorbacks have already beaten Tulsa and Oklahoma State and will be out to add the Frogs' scalp to their collection.

The Hogs will base their attack on the talents of Jim Mooty, a 170-pound halfback, and Jim Monroe, an unimpressive but consistent quarterback.

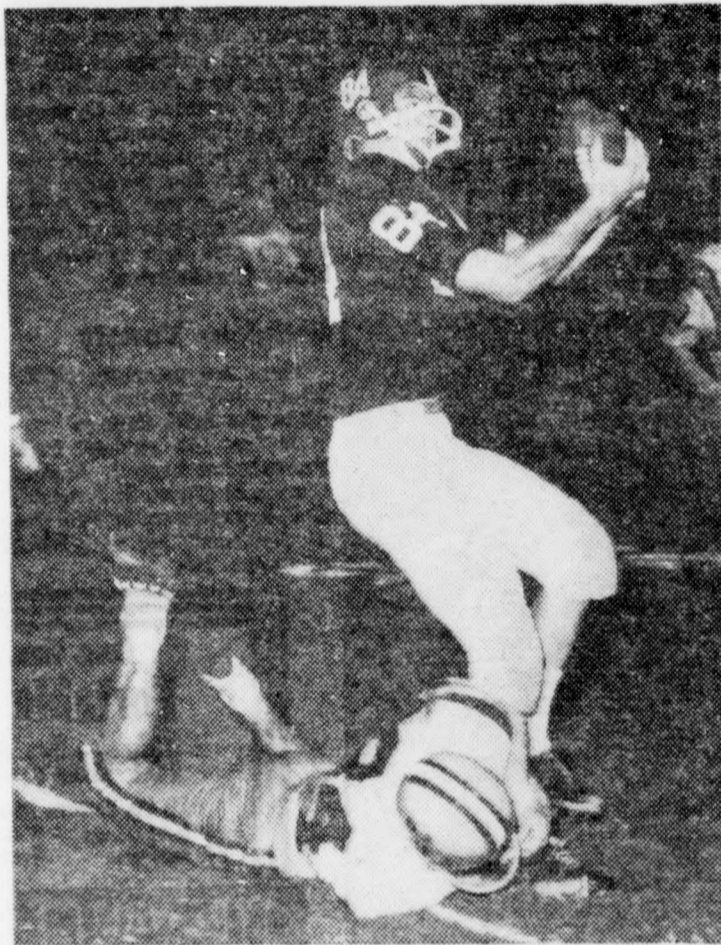
Mooty has been turning in All-America performances and is hailed as the best backfield man since Clyde Scott, the Razorback's All-America tailback in 1948.

Monroe didn't develop as the team pilot until spring training and since then, has turned in a better than average performance.

A twist of fate got Curtis Cox, sophomore fullback, a chance to show his talents, when he took over for Joe Paul Alberty, the regular starter who was out with an injury in the Oklahoma State game.

During spring training, Coach Frank Broyles said Cox wouldn't develop until mid-season. However, with his showing in the last game, Cox is destined to be a thorn in the Frogs' side.

Adding more fuel to the fire, the Razorbacks have five glue-fingered ends, heralded as the finest in the school's history. Led by Steve Butler, one of the conference's top pass receivers, the Hogs will give TCU's secondary a good workout.

TCU Leads Conference Offense

With the football season only two weeks old, the Frogs lead the Southwest Conference in total yards gained and first downs.

According to official statistics, TCU has a total of 591 yards gained and 32 first downs, while Texas is a close second with 532 yards and 23 first downs.

Texas leads the rushing column with 483 total yards rushing and SMU, having played only one game, leads the passing with 421 yards gained through the air.

TCU is second in passing, 204 yards, while their next opponent, Arkansas, is second in rushing, with 450 yards gained.
