## Campus involved in national Cyber Security Awareness Month

TCU INFORMATION SERVICES IS PARTICIPATING in a national initiative called Cyber Security Awareness Month to educate TCU students, faculty and staff about Internet risks and protection.

TCU's campaign, "Don't Get Spooked Online," will include sending computer safety tips and candy to all students with a TCU mailbox, sending tips to faculty/staff via interoffice mail and placing tent cards with safety tips around campus. "Each year numerous individuals fall victim to online identity theft," according to **Jim Mayne**, TCU senior network engineer. "Your most valuable possession is your identity."

With personal information, thieves can withdraw money from a bank account, charge or open new credit cards or loans, according to the Federal Trade Commission Web site. The FTC also warns that thieves could give the stolen name during an arrest; and if the court date is missed, an arrest warrant is issued in the name of the identity theft victim.

Overall, seven out of 10 Internet users will have a breach in computer security, according to the National Cyber Security Alliance that sponsors National Cyber Security Awareness Month.

Downloading, copying and installing programs, or Word and Excel documents from an unknown or untrusted source off a CD or the Internet, or opening pictures and links from any e-mail, challenge computer security because malicious software or malware, can be attached to the downloaded material. Malware can include viruses, worms, trojans or spyware that add unwanted computer programs, transfer personal information stored on your computer to unknown Internet destinations or even shut down your computer.

Malware can steal your information, but illegally downloading copyrighted material is also stealing.

The music and film industries have increased litigation efforts and students may face lawsuits and consequences for illegal file-sharing and downloading on campuses, according to a letter sent to TCU from the Recording Industry Association of America.

During Cyber Security Awareness Month, computer users should evaluate their Internet use, review their machines for software patches and the presence of anti-virus and anti-spyware software, ensure their computer receives automatic patch updates, spyware and anti-virus updates and that they always maintain a current back-up their data. ♦
