Dear Mrs. Shirk:

Mr. Carter left the city a few days ago and handed me your letter of January 3 asking that I acknowledge it for him and to apologize for the delay which has been due to a multiplicity of outside duties and entertainment of out of town guests that prevented him from taking care of the accumulation of mail on his desk.

The only information we have with reference to sending packages to prisoners of war in Germany has come from the War Department and I am sure you will receive the information bulletin when you receive the official labels to place on the packages. If you have not already done so, ask your local Red Cross chapter to have your name placed on their list for the monthly Red Cross bulletins. These give you a little more information about the life of the prisoners in these camps.

We receive letters from Amon Junior rather regularly every four or five weeks and while I am sure they are facing a tough situation, his letters indicate that they are in good spirits and are making the best of it. He has been a prisoner 11 months. If I see anything of particular interest concerning the 36th Division, I will be glad to forward it to you.
