The search for a new athletic director is now under way

CHANCELLOR VICTOR J. BOSCHINI JR. announced that TCU has begun its national search for a new athletic director and will be assisted in the search by Baker-Parker, a highly regarded firm based in Atlanta, GA.

Baker-Parker is a global search firm with engagements in most industrial, service and not-for-profit sectors, but its practice in higher education and collegiate athletic search is one of the most highly regarded in the country. Baker-Parker has recently completed successful athletic director searches with the University of Georgia, Ohio State University, University of Washington, University of Nevada-Reno and Emory University, and is completing one now at Arizona State University. The firm recruited current president Myles Brand for the NCAA, and also has represented them in other searches.

"We are looking forward to working with Baker-Parker because they have the reputation as one of the best in the business," said Chancellor Boschini, who will chair the search process. "We will move quickly and hope to have the position filled by the time Eric Hyman leaves."

"Eric is terrific," said Boschini. "Not only has he been named athletic director of the year, but has accomplished the hard work of planning, building facilities, raising money, hiring coaches, and making TCU known at the national leadership levels of intercollegiate athletics. We are committed to continuing what he has helped established here, and know that his foundation will help us attract a top talent to the position. This is going home for Eric and Pauline, and we are grateful for the time they spent as Horned Frogs."

The search committee is comprised of Chancellor Boschini, who will function as chair of the committee, Provost Nowell Donovan, and professor and athletics representative to the NCAA Rhonda Hatcher. Search committee members from the TCU Board of Trustees include Chairman of the Board John V. Roach, Chair-elect J. Luther King Jr., Vice-chair Clarence Scharbauer, and trustees Brenda Cline, Malcolm Loudon and Ron Parker. Student athletes will be involved in the process as well.

In order to maintain the integrity of the search, and out of respect for the candidates, committee members will not be making public statements. The committee chairman will be its spokesman, but there will be no speculation or discussion about potential candidates during the search process. ♦

Frances Colpitt, scholar in 20th century art, named Deedie Potter Rose Chair of Art History

DR. FRANCES COLPITT, A NATIONALLY known scholar in 20th century art, has accepted the position of Deedie Potter Rose Chair of Art History in the College of Fine Arts, effective Aug. 15.

Colpitt comes to TCU from the department of art and art history at the University of Texas at San Antonio where she has been the chair since 2002. She is the author of *Abstract Art in the late Twentieth Century* and *Minimal Art: The Critical Perspective*. She received her

B.F.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Tulsa and a Ph.D. degree in art history from the University of Southern California.

"We are delighted to welcome Dr. Colpitt to our faculty," says Scott Sullivan (dean, College of Fine Arts). "As a leading critic, curator and scholar in contemporary art, she will engage both the community and our students in this dynamic and challenging field. Dr. Colpitt's expertise will also enhance our ongoing
