## Monnig Meteorite Gallery sponsoring Jupiter Day events Thursday evening

STARGAZERS WILL HAVE A RARE opportunity to view one of the solar system's most unique planets and its moons when the Monnig Meteorite Gallery hosts Jupiter Day this Thursday in the Sid W. Richardson building.

The event, which is free and open to the public, begins at 7 p.m. with a presentation on Jupiter and its moons by Dr. Paul Schenk, a staff scientist with the Lunar and Planetary Institute. Telescopes will be made available to the public from 8-11 p.m. and special audio and visual presentations on Jupiter will be shown throughout the evening. The Meteorite Gallery also will be open from 1-4 p.m. and 8-11 p.m.

## College of Fine Arts to host three-week exhibition of Holocaust narratives, art

*TALES OF SLAVERY AND DELIVERANCE*, an exhibit of 25 stories from the Holocaust and 13 accompanying etchings, will be on display at the University Art Gallery from April 27-May 1, 2004.

Author of these moving narratives is Dr. Anna Ornstein who survived internment at Auschwitz as a teen, and later immigrated to America to become a respected professor of child psychiatry at the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. Each Passover for 25 years, she told her family a story about her experiences in the death camp and the strength that sustained her during World War II. Those vivid memories are the basis for the exhibition. The etchings, as well as four large-format paintings included in the show, are the work of Stewart Goldman, emeritus professor of painting at the Art Academy of Cincinnati.

Ornstein and Goldman will be honored at a reception from 5-8 p.m. Sunday, May 2 in the gallery. The two will discuss their work at 6 p.m.

*Tales of Slavery and Deliverance* has been displayed at the Actives Museum in Wiesbaden, Germany, the Athenaeum of Ohio in Cincinnati, the Kent State University Museum in Ohio and the Michael Solway Gallery in Cincinnati. The Fort Worth exhibition is supported by TCU College of Fine Arts, The Jewish Federation of Fort Worth and Tarrant County and The Herzstein
