General and Mrs. Eisenhower are here to participate Tuesday in unveiling of a life-size statue and portrait of Will Rogers on the anniversary of the birth of the humorist-philosopher.

10,000 Will Witness Rogers Statue Unveiling; Clear Skies Are Forecast

General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower joined Miss Margaret Truman and relatives and friends of Will Rogers in Fort Worth Tuesday to pay homage to the humorist-philosopher and dedicate the statue of the beloved American in front of the auditorium and coliseum named for him.

Clear skies and moderate winds and temperatures were forecast for the afternoon of the anniversary of Rogers' birth, and a crowd of 10,000 was expected to throng before the speakers' stand under the Will Rogers Memorial Tower when the dedication ceremony starts at 3 p. m.

Former Congressman Fritz Lanham will preside and Rev. James K. Thompson will deliver the invocation. Then Miss Truman will sing "Home on the Range," the favorite song of Will Rogers. F. J. Adams will present the

statue to the city on behalf of Amon Carter, the donor, and Mayor Deen will accept it.

General Eisenhower will speak on the heritage Rogers left America, and after unveiling the life-size bronze statue of the great humorist, he will cross to the coliseum to unveil a portrait of Rogers painted by Seymour M. Stone of New York, also donated by Carter.

Preceding the dedication General and Mrs. Eisenhower and Miss Truman and their parties will attend a luncheon given by Carter at Shady Oak Farm. After the dedication they will be entertained at a reception at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bruno K. Graf, 800 River Crest Rd., and with a dinner given by Carter at River Crest Country Club.

The general and his lady and his aide, Maj. Robert L. Schulz, arrived Monday night and were whisked through a crowd at Santa Fe station to the Fort Worth Club, where they and the Truman group are guests of Carter.

The Eisenhowers will leave for Washington Tuesday night on the Texas and Pacific Railway, and Miss Truman will depart at 10:30 p. m. Tuesday for Amarillo.

Among those who have arrived and will be on the speaker's stand are: Mrs. Eisenhower; her sister and brother-in-law, Maj. and Mrs. Gordon C. Moore of San Antonio; Fred G. Gurley, president of the Santa Fe Railroad Company, and Mrs. Gurley, of Chicago; Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Brandon of New York; Jesse Jones of Houston; C. R. Smith, chairman of the board of American Airlines, New York; Harry C. Wiess, president of Humble Oil & Refining Company, and Mrs. Weiss, Houston; Silliman Evans, publisher of the Nashville Tennessean; and Adm. and Mrs. Adolphus Andrews of Dallas.

Winant Suicide Linked to Illness

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 4 (AP). John G. Winant, wartime ambassador to Great Britain and three times governor of New Hampshire, shot himself to death Monday night with a .32 caliber Belgian pistol.

The 58-year-old diplomat, who retired in January as permanent U. S. representative on the UN economic and social council, was officially pronounced a suicide by Medical Referee Clarence E. Butterfield. Dr. Butterfield attributed the act to overwork.

His secretary, J. Bernard Teulon, said Winant's health had not been good and that a doctor advised him to "take things easy"

as he had a heart condition and was suffering kidney or bladder trouble.

"I know Mr. Winant has been working very hard lately on writing and business affairs and I believe that he suddenly cracked," said Teulon. "This suicide was done on the spur of the moment."

Winant had just completed his memoirs—"Letter From Grosvenor Square"—for Nov. 15 publication and was understood to be planning a sequel.

His body was found lying face down near a firearms cabinet in his son's bedroom by a secretary and maid after they heard a thud—but no shot.

Doctors said there were indications Winant had fired the bullet through his right temple while kneeling.

A box of headache pills, some missing, was in the room.

Two guns were near by—the Belgian pistol and a German Luger that apparently had been thrown against the bedroom wall when Winant could not find ammunition.
