## AIDS Memorial Quilt exhibit coming to campus Dec. 1-2

TCU, FORT WORTH/TARRANT COUNTY NAMES Project, AIDS Interfaith Network and AIDS Outreach will host a two-day exhibition of the AIDS Memorial Quilt Dec. 1-2 in the Student Center ballroom. The exhibit will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Dec. 1 and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Dec. 2 and will feature 200 specifically requested individual panels with local significance.

"This project is very important for the University and Fort Worth because it increases awareness especially among young people," said **Angie Taylor**, co-chair of the TCU Quilt Project. "Bringing the quilt is a great way to open discussion on (AIDS) issues."

Throughout the two-day display, names on the quilt will be read hourly to honor those who have died from AIDS. There also will be drama and music performances in front of the Student Center and in the Student Center lounge. An interdenominational service will be held at 6 p.m. Dec. 1 in University Christian Church, and Catholic mass also will be held in the quilt display area at 5 p.m. Dec. 2.

Several resources will be available to visitors, including an interactive educational area, a grief counseling room, and a place for members of the community to turn in panels they have made to be included in the quilt.

Campus organizations involved with the project include Student Development Services, Campus Ministries, Campus Life, the International Student Association, and several academic departments and colleges, including social work and the College of Fine Arts. ♦

## Reserved parking spaces go to five winners in Self-Study drawing

RESULTS OF THE RECENT SURVEYS distributed online by the SACS Self-Study Program to faculty, staff, students and alumni are in and being tabulated. The number of participants was deemed unusually high, thanks in part to incentives offered to those taking time to fill out the questionnaire.

Five free, reserved parking spaces were offered to participating faculty/staff whose TCU ID numbers were chosen in a drawing. The winners are: **Oleta Jones** (Neeley

School), **Pam Sanguinet** (registrar's office), **Isabel Gomez** (residential services), **Julie Bryne** (religion) and **Mike Meckna** (music).

The SACS Self-Study office sent out 399 surveys to full-time faculty, of which 249 were returned (a 62% return rate). They sent 188 to part-time faculty, of which 48 were returned (a 25% return rate). They sent 962 staff surveys online, with 554 returned (a 57% rate) and another 115 on paper, with 79 returned (a 69% rate).

A questionnaire surveying the student population went out to undergraduate and graduate students. A drawing for various amounts of cash was the incentive for student participants. The winners were: **Kaleena Kristinek**, \$1,000; **Laura K. Bailey** and **Kenneth Wardle**, \$500 each; **Kelly Patek**, **Nicholas Reiter**, **Alison Kothe**, **Christi Berdine** and **Meagan Nedlo**, \$100 each. ♦
