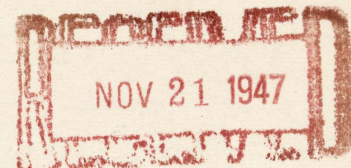

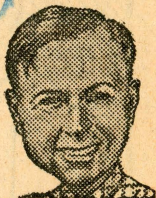

The name of grand old Will Rogers was in the news the other day when a monument, the gift of his friend, Amon Carter, was unveiled in Fort Worth by Gen. Ike Eisenhower after a song by Miss Margaret Truman. And this event called to mind many of the utterances of the cowboy humorist and philosopher.

Will was proud of his Indian ancestry and he once remarked "my ancestors didn't come over on the Mayflower—but they were on hand to greet the folks who did."

And when he wanted to go abroad and was getting his passport, Will was called on to produce a birth certificate. He explained: "Back in Oklahoma, being born was a sort of private matter. And if a fellow is here, we just sorter took that as proof that he had been born."

(He got the passport, allright.)

The most often-quoted of all Will's remarks was, "I never met a man I didn't like."
