Old Greek Bible Is Valuable Item In T. C. U. Library

A Greek New Testament 392 years old is one of the prizes in a collection of Ancient Bibles that is a part of the T. C. U. Library.

This old worm-eaten book was printed in 1550, sixty-one years before the publication of the King James version of the Bible.

Printed in "Royal Greek," said to be the most beautiful Greek type ever devised, this is one of the most valuable books in the library.

This was the first Bible to carry marginal references, and the publisher was severely criticized for his "additions" to the Bible. The Bible had not been divided into verses in 1550, so this edition lacks the familiar verse numbering.

The cover of the book is made of wood, overlaid with pigskin. There are worm holes in the backs, and some penetrate the entire volume. Brass clasps and hasps hold it closed.

On the cover is a stamped design which shows pictures illustrating Bible quotations, with Latin phrases describing the pictures.
