

Former Professor Of Texas U. Listed As Enemy of U. S.

Washington, Jan. 25.—Lindley M. Keasbey, a professor in the University of Texas, was called an enemy of his country by Senator King of Utah in the senate committee investigating German propaganda Friday.

Senator King made his statement after Archibald Stevenson, an agent of the army military intelligence branch, had read Keasbey's name in a "Who's Who" of persons who held views opposed to the American cause. Stevenson read the list at the request of Senator Nelson of Minnesota. In all there were 30 names, and included were Morris Hilquist, Scott Nearing, Kate Richards O'Hare, Amos Pinchot, Helen Phelps Stokes and Eugene Debs.

Stevenson said Keasbey studied in Germany and was a member of the organizing committee of the People's Council of America in Southern states.

"Are our universities a festering spot for that sort of thing?" asked Senator King. "It is time for those who control the universities to look into the matter. When our nation is fighting a nation that is determined to destroy your country there is only one conclusion I can draw from the activities of persons if these activities in any degree help the enemy and hurt this country. These men are enemies of this country."
