JOSÉ CARPINTEYRO (ATHLETICS) WAS NAMED the winner of this year's Chancellor's Staff Award at the Opening Luncheon Friday in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. **Chancellor Victor J. Boschini Jr.** made the presentation.

The annual honor, originated in 2002, affirms the important contributions that staff make to the mission and vision of the University.

José, who came to TCU in 1984, has become athletics' "go-to guy" when it comes to getting a job done, according to colleagues. Not only does he carry "the magic key" that can access every lock in the athletics complex, his multi-tasking talents encompass electrical work, plumbing, masonry, general contracting, HVAC, basic engineering and auto mechanics, to name a few.

Although he used to travel with the football team as equipment manager, the scope of managing all the new sports facilities that have come on line in recent years keeps José pretty busy on campus these days. Take The T around campus or all the way to Dallas

AGAIN THIS YEAR, A TCU PREMIUM TRANSIT Pass for a wide variety of public transit options is free to all TCU students, faculty and staff from Sept. 1, 2008 through May 8, 2009.

Sponsored in partnership with The T, this year's pass offers more frequent and more direct bus service on the campus TCU Frog Shuttle. The pass also may be used for unlimited, free rides on all of The T's regular and express buses and trolleys throughout Fort Worth, the Trinity Railway Express (TRE) commuter train to and from Dallas, and Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) regular or express bus and light rail service in Dallas.

TCU transit pass holders must show their valid TCU picture ID, along with the 2008-09 TCU Premium Transit Pass, when using any of these services.

Frog Shuttle service has been improved to circulate more often around the main campus, leaving Pond Street Grill every 10 minutes on the 8's from 7:28 a.m. to 5:28 p.m. Monday through Friday except on holidays.

There are purple and white Frog Shuttle signs along the route. From the Pond Street starting point, the shuttle makes a seven-stop loop along Bellaire, West Berry, University, Cante, Stadium and back to Pond.

By using off-campus transit, you can travel free across the DFW Metroplex. The T's Route 7, which goes by the campus on University Drive, goes north to the Cultural District or downtown to the Intermodal Transportation Center. From the ITC, riders may transfer to nearly all other T bus routes or catch the TRE train eastbound to Dallas.

Students, staff and faculty may obtain the TCU Premium Transit Pass at the University Union Information Desk or at the TCU Police office, 3025 Lubbock. ♦

EFFECTIVE TODAY, ADDRAN COLLEGE WILL change its name from AddRan College of Humanities & Social Sciences to AddRan College of Liberal Arts. The college also developed new mission, vision and values statements.

The new name, mission, vision, and values statements better reflect who we are and what we strive to accomplish, said **Dean Andy Schoolmaster**.

The college completed a branding exercise with focus groups to question samples of students, faculty, staff and alumni about AddRan's strengths and distinctions. From discussions about the college came the suggestion to change the name of the college to be more descriptive of what the college offers, as well as update the mission, vision and values statements. ♦

The "real" Charlie Wilson on campus next week

Charlie Wilson was elected to the Texas Legislature in 1960 and was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1972. He spent 24 years there, 21 of them on the Appropriations Committee. Convinced that the decisive battle of the Cold War was beginning to take place between the Red Army and the Freedom Fighters of Afghanistan, in the 1980s Wilson dedicated himself to strengthening the cause of the Freedom Fighters. Wilson is the only civilian to hold the CIA award as "Honored Colleague." He also holds the Afghan Freedom Medal. ♦
