Dear Miss Offenburger:

Your letter of April 19th has been received during Mr. Carter's absence from the State and shall be brought to his attention as soon as he returns.

Meanwhile, permit the writer, in Mr. Carter's absence, to express his appreciation for your interest in Amon Junior's welfare. While it isn't the most pleasant thought in the world to know that Amon is a prisoner of war in Germany, still it gives us so much to hope for that we are very happy to know he is alive.

Although Mr. Carter has had no director word from Amon, three other officers in the same contingent as he was and captured about the same time and in the same vicinity have written their family and one Lieutenant who lived at Waxahachie, Texas, wrote his wife and asked her to let Mr. Carter know that Amon Junior was in the same camp with him and was fine.

We will continue to pray and hope that he will be all right and eventually come home. It is our understanding that there will be no exchange of prisoners -- that is abled bodied men and no officers at all.
