TCU's Native American and Indigenous Peoples Initiative for 2022-23 Academic Year (as of 5-15-2023)

We remain since 2015 guided by the following goals:

- 1. To raise awareness of and respect for Native American peoples, cultures, and perspectives
- 2. To learn from and respectfully engage Native American knowledge(s) throughout all levels of the campus community
- 3. To create a welcoming and respectful environment on campus for Native American students, faculty, staff, and visitors
- 4. To build healthy, respectful, and mutually beneficial relationships with Native American peoples and communities

We continue to follow a model based on:

- Learning from (rather than about) Native American peoples (and avoiding the "scholaras-expert" model)
- Working with individual faculty, departments, and programs at TCU to develop Native American programming and relationships that are relevant to their specific needs (rather than siloing campus efforts in a single department or program)

Building an Inclusive Infrastructure and Environment:

- The Four Directions Scholars program was approved in Spring 2023. Two four-year scholarships (fully funded tuition and room and board) will be awarded annually beginning in 2024-25 to first-year undergraduate students who are citizens of federal or state recognized tribes. A mentoring program will be established to support recipients.
- Discussions occurring over how to institutionalize the position of Native American Nations and Communities Liaison
- Developed, distributed, and placed on TCU's Native American and Indigenous Peoples Initiative <u>webpage</u> the document, "Teaching with TCU's Land Acknowledgment and Native American monument"
- Distributed and placed on TCU's Native American and Indigenous Peoples Initiative webpage the infographic, "Why Use TCU's Land Acknowledgment?," meant to encourage faculty and staff to use the Land Acknowledgment in courses and programs. Also developed and distributed a poster of the text of TCU's Land Acknowledgment and a visual representation of the Land Acknowledgment.
- Met with the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee in TCU's Housing and Residence Life to brainstorm better representation of local Native American Nations in the university's residence halls and on campus

Building Inclusive Education, Programming, and Partnerships:

- TCU welcomed two new hires in Native American-related fields in Fall '22:
 - Dr. Pablo Montes is an Assistant Professor in Curriculum Studies in the College of Education and a descendant of the Chichimeca Guamares and P'urépecha people

from the valley of Huatzindeo, specifically from a small rancho called La Luz at the foot of the Culiacán mountain

- Dr. Abel Gomez is Assistant Professor of Religion with a concentration in Native American and Indigenous Spiritual Traditions and descends from Nicaraguan, Salvadoran, and Mexican lineages that migrated to the San Francisco Bay Area, the homeland of the Ohlone peoples
- Meet-and-greet events to introduce them to TCU faculty and the local Native American community held respectively on Sept. 13 (at TCU) and 17 (at the Urban Inter-Tribal Center in Dallas)
- TCU's **2022 Common Reading** (a program for incoming students) addressed the book, *The Marrow Thieves*, by Cherie Dimaline, a registered member of the Metis Nation of Ontario. The book is part of the broader field known as Indigenous futurisms.
