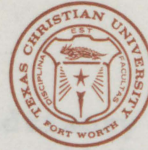

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NEW V-C FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Hope everyone saw Sunday's announcement that Dr. James W. Newcomer has been named Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs effective Sept. 1. Dean of the Faculty and Graduate Studies at TWU in Denton since 1960, he brings years of experience and a long record of accomplishment to the new job. He succeeds Dr. Moudy, of course, who supervised our academic program from 1962 until he became Chancellor July 1.

Now 53, Dr. Newcomer won his Ph. B. from Kenyon College magna cum laude and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. His M.A. was from Uof Michigan in 1938 and Ph. D. from Uof Iowa in 1953. His major field was English and over the years he has authored dozens of poems, articles, essays and book reviews. His experience includes four years of public school teaching; five as assistant headmaster and English Head at Elgin Academy; three years of distinguished service in the famed Third Army in Europe; six years as Dean of College and Head of English at Hockaday in Dallas; eight years as Dean of College and Professor of English at Olivet College in Michigan.

Mrs. Newcomer is a graduate of Wheaton College and taught science at Centenary. They have girls 17 and 12, a boy 15. They will be a welcome addition to our "Campus Family". The appointment, of course, fills one of the major gaps in our new administrative lineup. Indications now are that we will have a full complement of leaders for Fall semester.

OVER 300 SUMMER GRADS?

Right now, Joe Enochs lists some 340 degree candidates for August 27. While there'll be some losses, it now seems certain that we'll graduate more than 1,000 in a calendar year (there were 747 in June) for the first time. Again everyone is urged to make plans to take part in Summer Commencement which is set for 7:30 p.m. in the Coliseum. Dr. Carey Croneis, Chancellor of Rice, will be the speaker. As usual, the faculty will head the processional in full regalia.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL EXPANDED

The Administrative Council, the high-level advisory body which is now meeting weekly with Chancellor Moudy, will be made up of eight members during the 1965-66 school year. Other members are Vice-Chancellors L. C. White, Earl Waldrop, James Newcomer (Academic Affairs), Assistant Chancellor Amos Melton, Assistant to the Chancellor O. James Sowell, Dean of Students Howard Wible, and Dr. Leigh Secrest, President of the Research Foundation.

Dr. Moudy feels that the meetings, while usually fairly brief, are ideal for the interchange of ideas and sharing of opinions on many aspects of our plans, programs and problems.

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DEAN LaGRONE TAKES COMMAND

'Tis awful good to have Herb LaGrone back on campus. The new Dean of School of Education reported three weeks ago and is busily engaged in taking over down in Bailey Bldg. He reports that two-year tour in Washington, D.C. when he conducted that \$215,000 research program for the American Assn. of Colleges for Teacher Education, was both challenging and fruitful. Formally entitled "A Project to Improve the Professional Sequence in Pre-Service Teacher Education Through the Selection and Planned Use of New Media", the study made Herb a recognized expert in the field. He's in much demand as a speaker on new techniques and teaching methods in public schools.

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REPORT FROM ACPRA SESSION

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FROGS PICKED FOR 6TH SPOT

Jim Brock reports that TCU is picked for sixth place in the upcoming SW Conference football race by 117 writers and broadcasters in the 32nd annual TCU Poll. Texas (who else?) was top favorite with Arkansas (why shore) close behind. The others, in order: Baylor, Texas Tech, Rice, TCU, SMU and Texas A&M. The experts have been right only 9 times in previous tries.

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POLICY ON SERVICES CALLUPS

While it does not appear now that many large military units will be called up because of Vietnam, it seems inevitable some individual students will be affected. University policy for them has already been discussed.

As it was in other times, such students who have completed half or more of a period (semester or Summer term) with passing grades will be given full academic credit for them but no tuition refund. Those who have completed less than half a period cannot be given academic credit but will receive tuition refund on a prorated basis.

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SECOND SIX-WEEKS REGISTRATION

With an additional 20 to be enrolled in late-starting programs, we had 1,739 registered for the second Summer Term, according to the figgers of Asst. Registrar Joe Enochs. This is only 74 below last year's record. Again Grad School was the only division showing an increase. The figgers: Day School Undergrads, 1,245, Grad School 264, Brite 62, Evening College 168.

ORIENTATION SESSIONS SEPT. 9-10-11

In answer to a number of queries, we hasten to report that our annual Fall meetings are set for the mornings of Sept. 9-10-11 this year. 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HARRIS COLLEGE GETS GRANTS, LOANS ✓

Public Health Service traineeship grants totaling \$74,338 and Student Loan Funds totaling more than \$15,000 for 1965-66 have been received by Harris College of Nursing. They were approved under the program of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The grants are available to registered nurses who wish to complete degree requirements as well as those who hold B.S. degrees but have had no public health nursing. Thirteen awards have been made so far. Under the loan program, students may borrow up to \$1,000 per academic year. Incidentally, Dean Lucy Harris reports she had a fine vacation at the seashore on the East Coast. Much deserved, we'd say.

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NEW PUBLICATIONS OUT

In preparation for Fall semester, revised publications have been pouring from the presses. Included is the "Frog Calendar" for 1965-66 with all major events listed for the upcoming year (as planned and printed by Lib Proffer's office).
